

Halton Film is Winner at International Festival

A film about Halton County won an international award at a festival in New York last year and county council last Tuesday received the framed award and silver medal for display in the county building.

The film entitled "The Man and the Boy' produced by Robert Myers of Toronto is a 26 minute promotion of Halton County with the message that the county is a great place to live, work and play.

Up to 20,000 people have seen the film since it won the oward, said J. C. McIntyre, clerk of Nassagaweya Twp., after he officially presented the award to the county council.

McIntyre is chairman of the Halton County Industrial Development Committee. The film also tried to sell the county as a desirable location for all manner of industry.

In accepting the award Warden George Currie said this is County 'can carry on its own.' He was referring to Halton remaining a separate regional government when Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy Mcernment takes effect.
