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ELEVEN COMPETITORS AGAIN IN TRI-COUNTY MINOR LOOP

All eleven towns that competed in the Tri-County Minor Hockey League last year, Acton, Brampton, Chinguncousy, Oakville, Guelph, Milton, Streetsville, Hespeler, Burlington, Georgetown and Preston were represented at the first league meeting for the 1959-70 season, in Milton last week.

The secretary received a letter from Streetsville requesting that in the case of a clash in sweater colors the home team supply pullovers of a different color for the visiting team to wear. After some discussion on the subject the request was denied by a vote of the executive. As was the case last year, it will be the duty of the home team to change sweaters in the event of a color clash.

This year's schedule will begin on or about Oct. 19th for towns that have ice. Others will begin as soon as ice is available in their particular towns. The final date for player's certificates to be forwarded for group play will be November 15th, the same as last year.

Referee in chief Don Lawrence reported that a referees' forum will be held in Oakville, November 5th.

The OMHA annual meeting will be held at the King Edward Hotel in Toronto, October 18th. Each town will be allowed one delegate for each of their five teams providing their entry fee has been paid by that time.

The Tri-County President's Dinner will be held in Milton, December 5th, with the president of each local organization plus the Tri-County representative attending.

Raiders lost a large crop of players last year through age and the talent that normally would step in to fill the holes may be too good for Junior C ranks. Without some luck it could be a down year.
