### WEEKLY O.P.P. REPORT

During the week of Sept. 21-27 inclusive, officers of the Ontario Provincial Police, North Halton Detachment, worked a total of 10,331 hours, and patrolled 10,331 miles on area roads under their jurisdiction. Charges were laid against 53 motorists for violations under the Highway Traffic Act, and 30 more were given warnings for less serious errors. Convictions were registered against 83 persons during proceedings in Provincial Judge's Court held in Milton.

Occurrences of a general nature reported to the detachment this week dropped to 29. Included were 3 thefts, 3 fraud complaints, 1 of which was unfounded, 1 complaint of breaking and entering, 1 investigation under the Liquor Control Act resulted in 1 person being charged, 2 trespassing comp-

plaints were checked out, and 2 instances of sudden death were investigated. There was 1 disturbance, and 1 impaired driver was apprehended. The remaining were minor occurrences and required a minimum amount of time to clear.

Early Sunday morning 6 persons were sent out to hospital as a result of a violent head-on crash which occurred when a vehicle travelling west in the eastbound lane of Highway 401 collided with an eastbound vehicle. A charge of criminal negligence was laid when investigation was complete. There was also 1 fatal accident, and five other personal injury accidents. A total of 14 persons received injuries, and 1 was killed.

There were 5 property damage mishaps, and total property damage was estimated to be approximately \$12,650. Major causes of the collisions were: speed too fast for road conditions or traffic, inattentive driving, and improper lane change.
