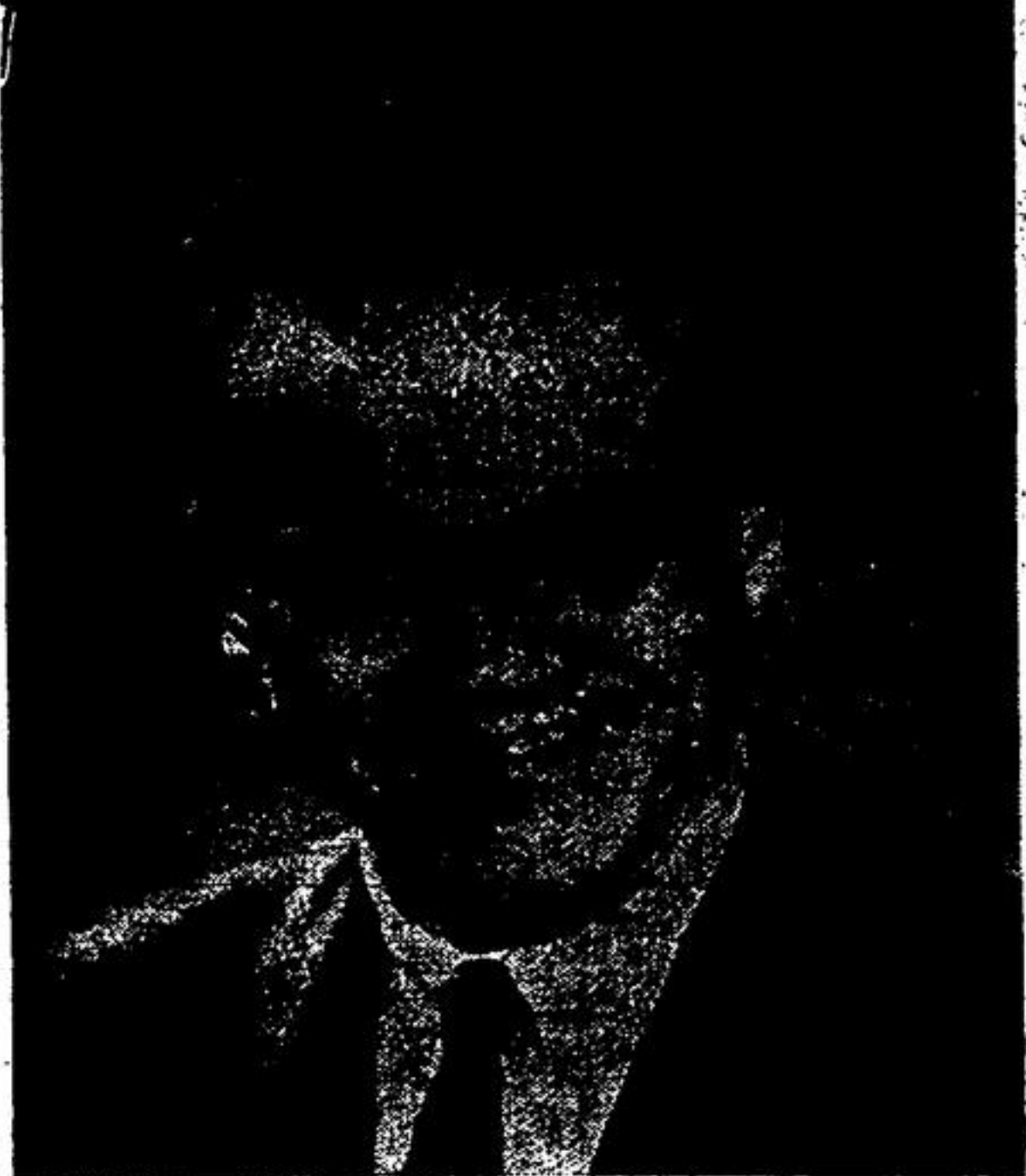

A Sunday morning fire damaged the interior of a car on Highway 7 just east of Norval.



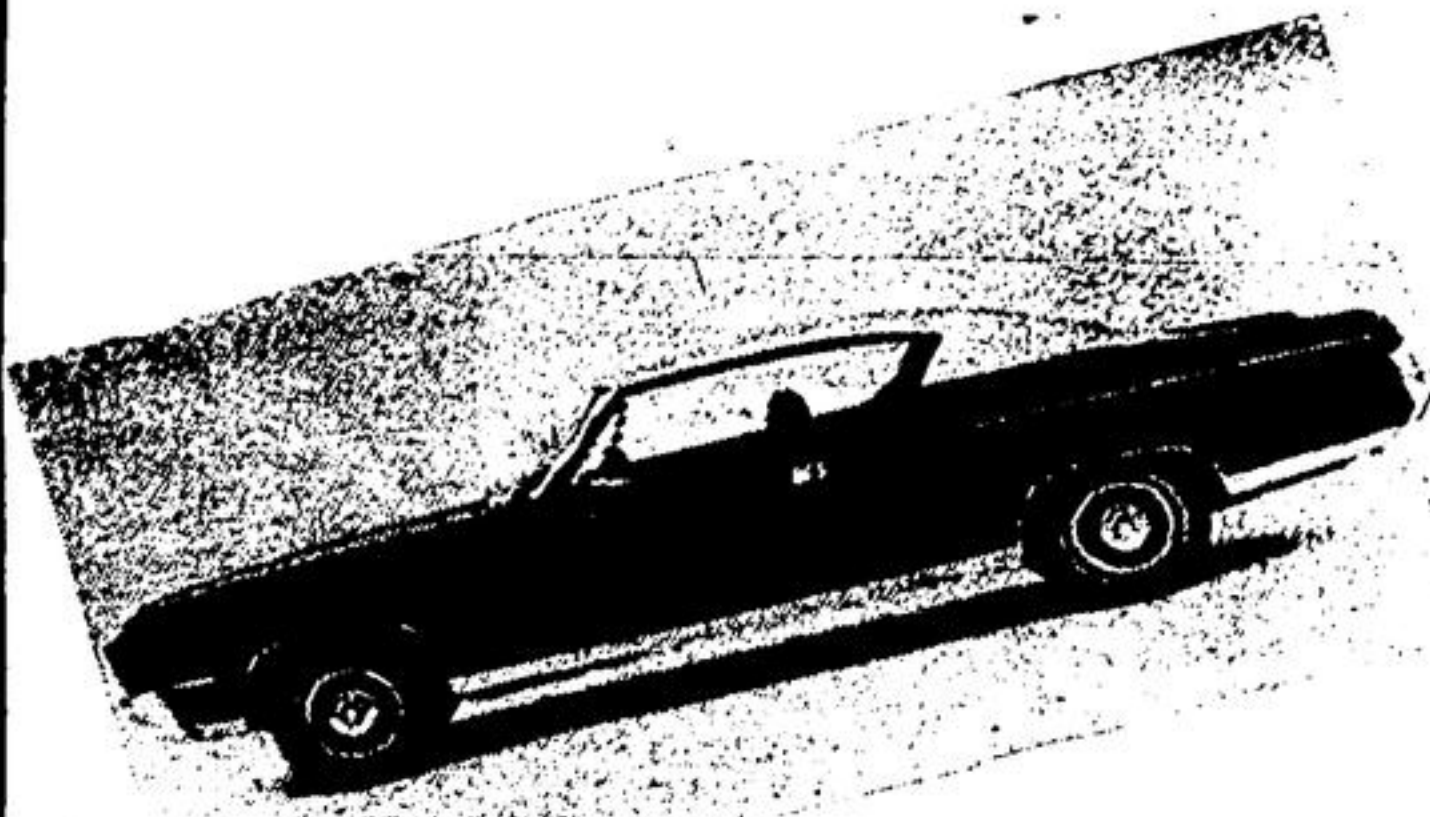
