## Automatic Signals Now Protect All Railway Crossings in Halton

All railway crossings on the Halton County road system are now protected by automatic warning signals county council was told last week.

Automatic signals have been installed this year at three crossings on county roads 8 and 15, completing protection throughout the county, county engineer D. J. Corbett reported.

Not all crossings were protected two years ago when two violent train-car collisions less

than a month apart claimed the lives of six teenagers.

Four north Halton youths, all 17 years old died when a freight train slammed into their 1938 Plymouth coupe at the CPR crossing at the First Line of Nassagaweya Township.

The top half of the car was completely sheared off the chassis and then split in two. Those killed were Terry Buskirk, Ronald Boers, John Newell and Louise Miller, all of the Campbellville area.

The crossing was not equipped with a warning device at the time.

Less than a month later a second train-car smash claimed the lives of two Milton teenagers.

The accident happened on Christmas Eve, 1967 when the car was struck broadside by a fast CN freight train at the crossing along the old Campbellville Road (the Fifth Side-road in Equezeing Township).

The two teens, Michael Wood, 18 and Brenda Phelps, 16, both of Milton, were delivering Christmas gifts at the time of the accident.

The crossing was protected by an unlighted warning sign.

Coroner's inquests into the fatalities urged all CPR crossings in north Halton to be protected by automatic "wig wag" signal lights.

Halton East MPP Jim Snow asked for a report on graded crossings in the county following the multiple deaths in the train-car collisions.

### Stole From Judge Gets 18 Months

A Georgetown man who admitted stealing money belonging to a judge was sentenced last week to 18 months definite and 12 months indeterminate in reformatory.

The 22 year old accused pleaded guilty to stealing \$50 from a wallet belonging to Judge John Ord. Sentence was imposed in Brampton Provincial Court by Judge W. D. August of New Toronto.

Crown Attorney Leo McGulgan said the accused removed the money from a wallet on a desk in the judge's chambers while Judge Ord was presiding in court September 18. He was alone in the back hall of the court house at the time awaiting to be released on his own recognizance on a charge of obstructing police.

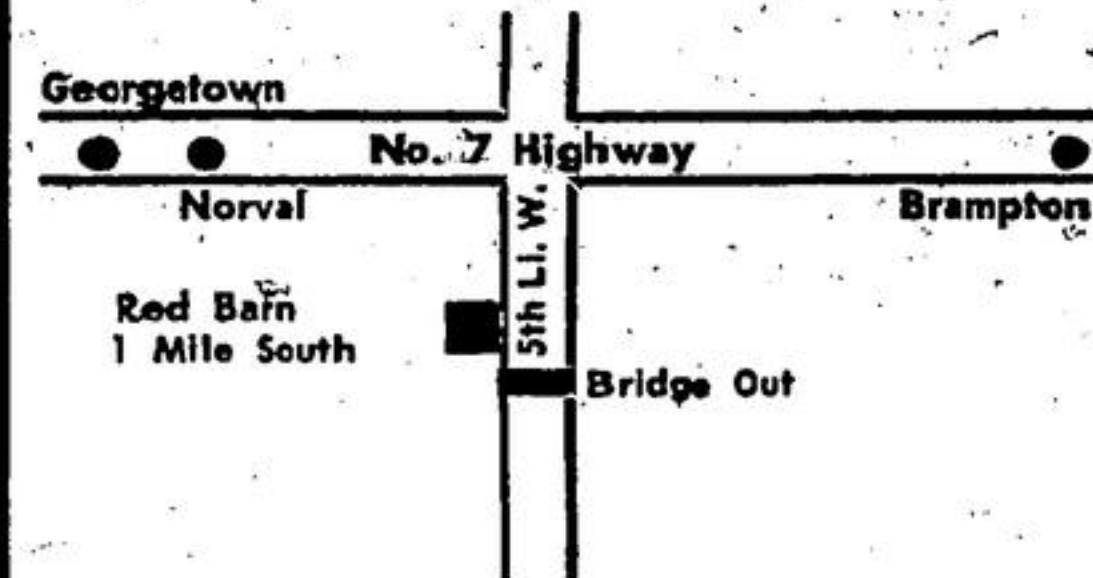
He admitted previous convictions for theft of a motor vehicle in 1963, breaking, entering and theft twice since 1965 and escaping custody.

Forty percent of the victims in hunting accidents in Ontario in 1967, were shot while standing within ten yards of the shoot-

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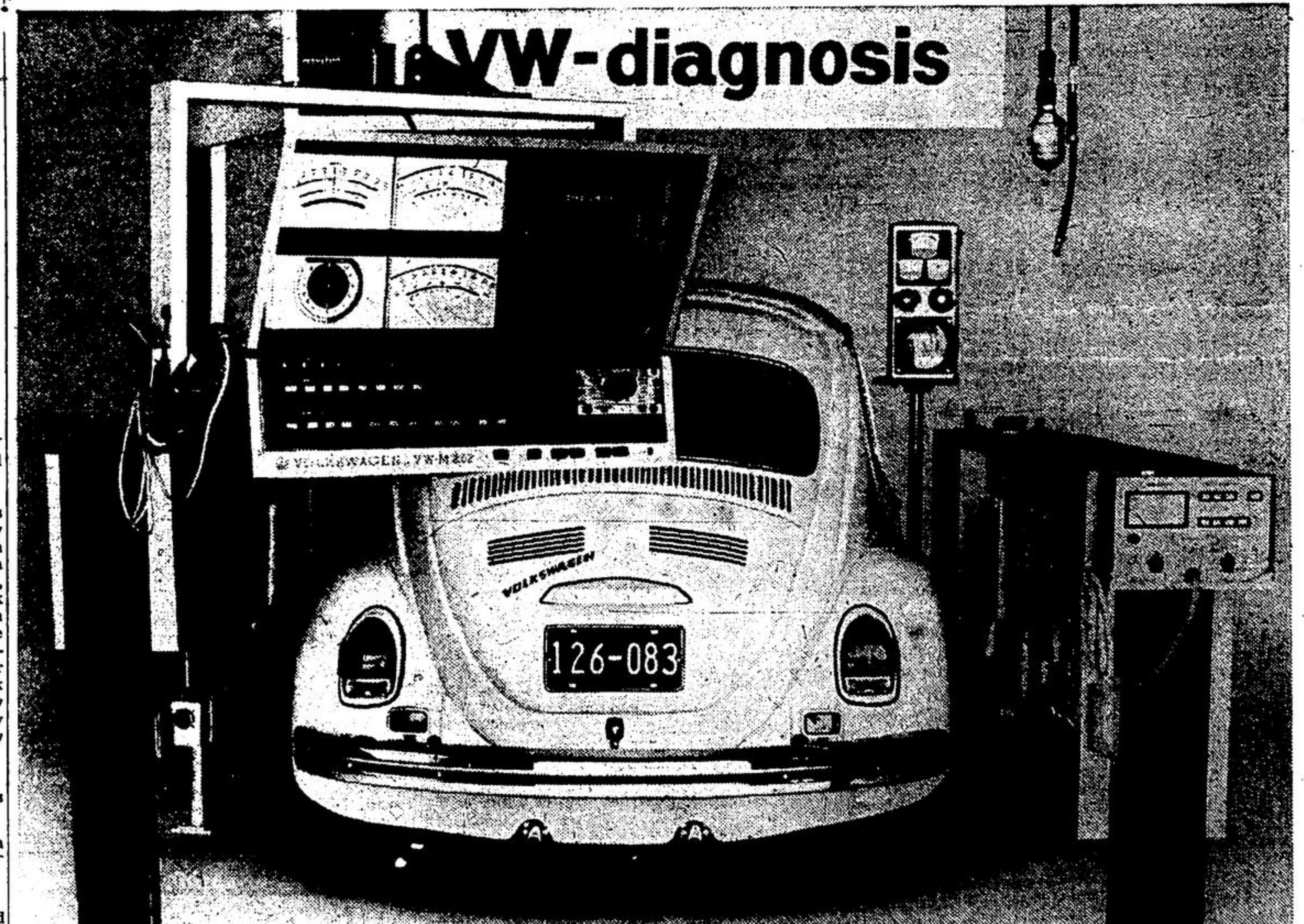


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
