

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Glen Captures Cup in Intercounty Fastball

Rebs Hit Stride, Win Handily from J.F. Ross

Georgetown Rebels shot the John F. Ross serial circus down in flames to gain a 13-8 victory in a battle of defenses in Georgetown park Friday, their first win of the Big Five Senior Football League. The Rebels were rocked 4-7 by Guelph Centennial in their opener a week earlier.

Hugh Williams, going two ways as the Reb's quarter back and safety, scored both Georgetown touchdowns. His offensive scoring play was a rollout from nine yards out. He was at the safety post when he picked off a Royals pass near mid-field and followed good blocking in for the TD.

Williams ran a second interception back for long yardage but had it wiped out on a roughing the passer call. The penalty allowed the Royals to retain the ball and moved them deep into Rebel territory. Two plays later Dodge scored their only touchdown.

Georgetown defensive backs Rick Peavoy and Chris Todd picked off two other Royal passes.

All the scoring came in the first half. The Rebels' line up include 15 new faces, graduates from the junior ranks of last year, and the inexperience in senior competition took some of the sting away from the team's offense.

Williams threw a few times but stayed mainly on the ground with Bob Sargent, Eric Peavoy, Bob Bull and Bruce Davies carrying the mail. On occasion, lugging it himself.

Bill Sykes, offensive end and defensive tackle, and Keith Bottemley at defensive tackle were stickouts.

In a junior game played the same day the baby Royals squashed the locals 30-6. A pass from quarterback Inglis to Cartwright accounted for Georgetown's major score.

Glen Williams mastered John Salmon and the Rockwood fast-ball club Thursday to capture their second Inter-County Fastball League championship in their five years in the circuit.

The Glen went ahead 1-0 in the first inning, and scored three more in the fourth to gain the 4-2 victory. They won the best of seven series by the same margin.

Rockwood won the first game the Glen the second, Rockwood the third and the Glen the next three.

Tex Leybourne and Max Stafford were the pitcher-catcher combination in the final meeting.

Fason Field scored the Glen's first run. He singled, stole second and third, and went home on a passed ball.

Leybourne started the three run outburst when he doubled. Stafford walked, Bill Zillo tripled and scored on Rick Peavoy's sacrifice fly.

The Glen has been managed this year by Tom Peavoy and Neil Best with coaching help from Pete Pomeroy.

Though they captured the 1969 title they just made the playoffs by the narrowest of margins. Three teams, Glen Williams, Norval and Hillsburgh tied for the last playoff spot and Glen Williams won third place in the round robin showdown.

They bumped first place Guelph out of the playoff picture with three straight victories in the semi-final.

The only other team to capture an Intercounty Fastball League crown is Hillsburgh who have turned the trick three times.

Pickeral were important as a tag returners suggest a large population of pickeral. However, netting and tagging have not been intensive enough to permit a population estimate. Other studies such as spawning areas, length and age classes still have to be carried out.

Pickeral were considered an uncatchable species until a few years ago. The fish management staff of the department of lands and forests has made the public more aware of the presence of pickeral by displaying trap-net catches. As a result more people are fishing for them.

Sportsmen should be aware that pickeral are present in good numbers in certain parts of the lake such as the east side of Thorax Island between the Trent Canal and Beaverton, the south side of Georgina Island between the Sand Islands and Duclos Point, and Cook Bay off the Jersey River.

Anglers find best success in the evening by trolling slowly with a rapala or flatfish. Fishermen who fish specifically for pickeral can usually hope to catch a good sized fish. Slow speed is the most important factor.
