Stop Burning Government Directive on Garbage

More trouble at Esqueving dump was reported to council Monday night, when a letter from the Dept. of Energy and Resources told of a further burning violation September 11.

The Department had already warned Esqueving against burning and had given them a December 1st deadline to discontinue the practice. They also asked for a letter showing intent to stop burning; and to explain their long range plan.

A letter on the same subject from the County of Halton asked Esqueving to explain their methods and costs of garbage

disposal to help the county complete a study of the feasibility of regional garbage disposal.

Jack Harris, dump supervisor said he had not started the fires reported on Sept. 11. He claimed he burned garbage infrequently, and only at night, others come in and start fires, he maintained.

He explained that the garbage was piled higher than usual because someone put sand in the crankcase of his bulldozer, and he had been unable to cover the garbage with landfill, as he normally does. He said his

bulldozer had been in for repairs for two months, but was expected back this week.

He asked if council wanted to stop burning completely at the dump, since he was originally told he could carry out controlled burning.

"As little as possible" replied acting reeve Tom Hill, "use landfill as much as possible."

"That would suit me fine," replied Mr. Harris, "It's miserable trying to push garbage back when it's burning."

Cr. Ken Marshall suggested there be signs stating the hours for dumping, and warning against starting fires. The possibility of erecting a gate was put forward by the acting reeve, but council felt the garbage might be dumped on the road-

side if the dump was locked. "There would be no need burning at all" stated the acting reeve, if garbage collected would tell their customers wrap or tie their bundles, paper, it could be all land fill.

Following this council decided to ask the garbage collectors to the next meeting to see if this could be forced.

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
