

Legionnaires Stress Significance Poppies For All School Pupils

October 9th, it's time to be thinking about poppy day. At least it is for some people. Now you may or may not know this but already Gord Reid who is running things for Poppy Chairman Bruce Collins who is still hospitalized, is receiving poppy supplies from Provincial Command. He is also planning his poppy campaign with his committee of Mrs. Joan Carter, Ron Dumper and Dave Louch. He is listing names of the many volunteers and organizations who will distribute poppies in Georgetown: Glen Williams, Norval, Limehouse and Stewartown. Every school in the district will be visited for it is the responsibility of Legionnaires to see to it that every child in Canada is able to wear a poppy regardless of his or her ability to make any financial contribution and to ensure that these citizens of tomorrow realize the significance of the poppy.

Each year the Royal Canadian Legion Dominion Command invites students from across the Dominion to enter the Remembrance Day essay contest. With in the next few weeks and prior to Remembrance Day, we hope to publish last year's three award winning essays.

The poppy campaign is the only co-ordinated national appeal to the public for funds to alleviate distress among ex-service personnel and their dependents. It is the only time the Legion as a national organization goes to the public with an appeal for funds. The poppy campaign cannot be merged with other community appeals because its primary aim is the distribution of poppies as symbols of remembrance.
