Cabinet Minister Grounded Washes Out C of C Speech

A scheduled talk on how the federal government handles employee relations was ironically cancelled last week.

Federal M.P. "Bud" Drury, treasury board president, was booked for a speaking engagement at the fall dinner meeting of Georgetown Chamber of Commerce at Georgetown Golf & Country Club.

Halton M.P. Rud Whiting was at Toronto airport to meet him when word came that Drury's department of transport plane had never taken off. As the plane taxied down the runway the pilot was told he would not be able to land at Toronto because of a wildcat strike of aircraft technicians.

He said he would be pleased to address the Chamber at a later date.

Filling in as speaker, Mr. Whiting said external affairs minister Mitchell Sharp will make a strong announcement this month of Canada's sovereignty over Arctic waters. An American oil tanker, the Manhattan, recently sailed the northwest passage, bringing the question to the fore.

He discussed the difficulty of national unity while some areas are prosperous and others poverty stricken. He serves on a committee investigating regional disparity.
