on his challenge, and later preached a series of sermons in my Church in Birmingham under the title that heads this article:

Can it be that some reader of these lines is asking himself a similar question? Is it beyond the realms of possibility that some of you are confused and bewildered? Is it too much to assume many are asking themselves in these days of unrest and turmoil what the message of the Christian Church is in such critical times? What does the Church offer to the man in the street? If I could be assured that some of my readers are asking themselves such pertinent and thoughtful questions then, like my Ministerial colleagues, I could give a variety of enswers to their quest.

When we turn to the pages of the New Testament we discover that Jesus offered Himself - and still offers Himself in this twentieth century - as a personal friend. And the Church of Jesus Christ is failing miserably in its Godgiven task unless it is engaged in this unparalleled mission.

We do not offer a dead Christ. We do not offer a crucifix. We do not offer a God remote and alienated from our cares and problems. We offer God as a living everpresent friend, one who takes a deep personal interest in each of us. The early disciples were energized and inviggrated and their whole outlook on life radically transformed when they discerned that Jesus was God available and approachable. No! We errif we put that last sentence in the past tense. Jesus IS God available and approachable - the great contemporary of every age and generation-And His words, spoken to human hearts two thousand years ago, to hearts that knew bitterness and sorrow, to hearts that the anguish of despair remain the same today: "Ye are my friends if ye do whatsover I command you."

Inevitably many will remain sceptical when the Church proclaims this message. Doubtless there are scoffers and unbelievers abroad in our day and generation just as they walked the streets in Christ's day. But to all such we would point to the Cross and proclaim: 'Here is the proof that a loving God is offering Himself as a personal friend and Sav-

James Stewart once said: The paradox of the cross is that the same event which unveils evil in all its terrifying demoniac malignity, reveals also invincible love."

To the question: What is involved in human friendship that is worth the name?' someone has given the following answer: 'Human friendship is an indefinable trust in one another; a constant communication between two minds; an unremitting anxiety for each other's welfare."

The friendship of Christ involves that! Can't you see, then, why we unashamedly assert that Christianity makes a big offer? Can you see what you are missing if you have not as yet responded to Christ's offer of friendship?

James G. Small who lived in the 1800's summed all we have tried to say in a lovely hymn:

> I've found a Friend; oh, such a Friend, So kind, and true, and tender! So Wise a Counsellor and Guide, So mighty a Defender! From Him who loves me no so well What power my soul can sever? Shall life, or death, or earth, or hell? Nol I am His for ever.__
