### Parents Try Everything Board Won't Bend Rule

Some parents will try anything to beat the county education board's age regulations and get their little kids into school.

The rule is that only children who turn five on or before the last day of February of the school year can be admitted to the school system.

Parents whose children have birthdays in March are out of luck and they're stuck with the kids at home for another year.

One woman who wanted to get her five-year old into kindergarten even though the child was born in March came to the board with the story that she had had a prolonged pregnancy and the child should really have been born in February. The approach was futile. The board stuck to the rules.

Halton education director Jim Singleton gave the account at last week's board meeting after trustee Doug Palmer asked if there's any chance for the parents whose children were born just after the February 28 limit.

Parents have been known to present phoney documents to sneak their underage kids into kindergarten, the board heard.

Trustee Palmer noted one parent called him to see if his child who turned five just a few days after February 28 could be admitted to the school system.

Not a chance, the board agreed. The age regulations must be strictly adhered to, said deputy director D. S. Lawless.

Singleton noted that whatever date is set, there will always be someone born the day after.

The only solution recommended for parents whose kids miss out getting into school by a day or two is to send them to a day-care institution until the next school year.
