gley; social welfare secretary, Wendy Stafford.

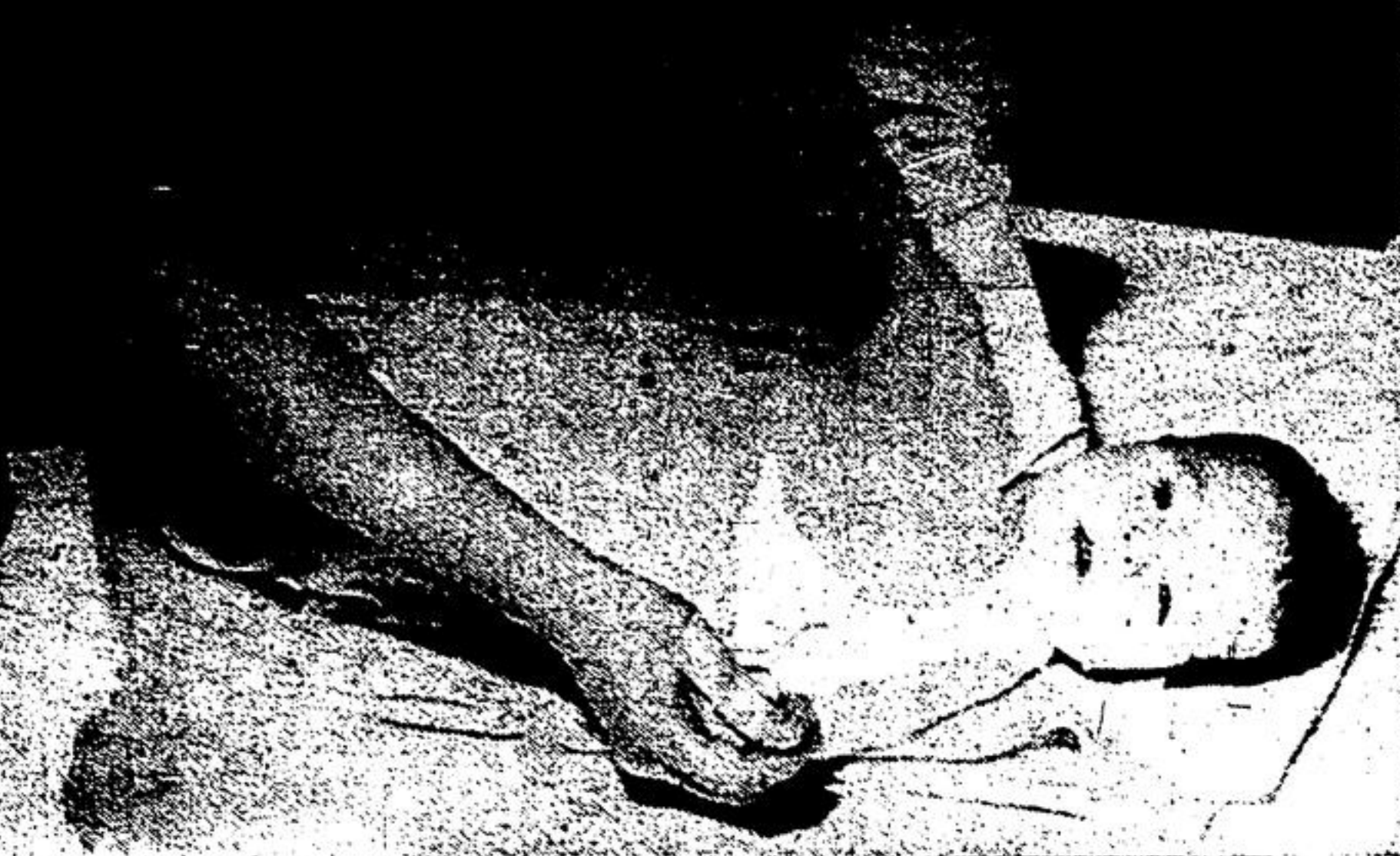
At the Wednesday evening meeting final plans were made for the rummage sale and baking and candy sale to be held in the church basement Saturday morning.
