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### LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Most bridge players know of the advantage of leading towards an Ace - Queen in a suit You hope that your left hand opponent has the king and he must play before you commit yourself to the ace or queen That's the idea behind a simple finesse. However, many bridge players do not realize the advantage of generally leading towards high cards. It's always a good idea to make one opposient play before you put on one of-your honor cards.

Here is an example from last week's action at the Acton ridge Club. Two declarers went astray - how would you have done?
