Prior to her marriage the bride was honoured with five showers: Mrs. Sharon Scheel and Mrs. Marg Tuck held a

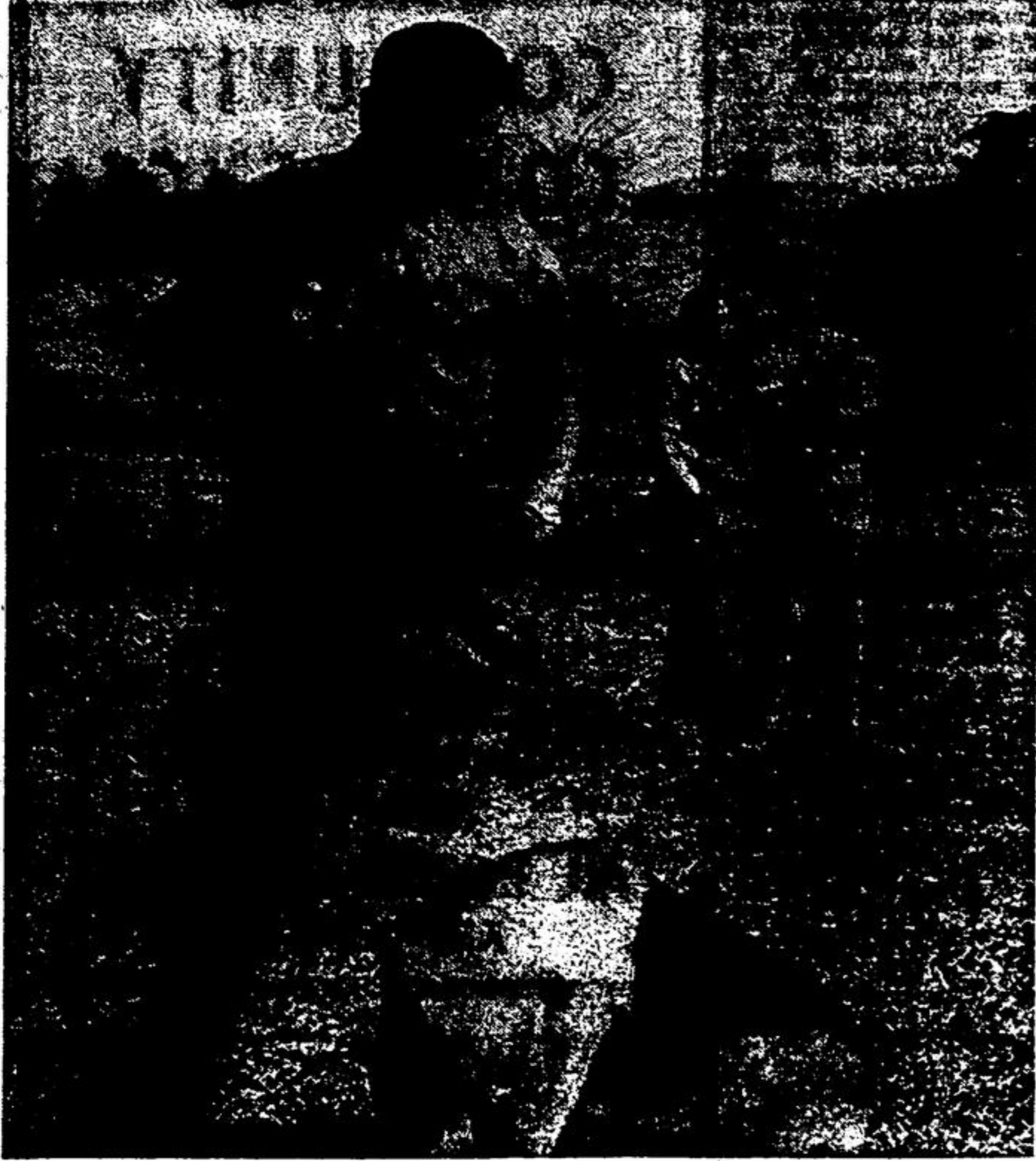
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SCHOOLS IN FOR K9 CLASS
