NOTICE OF APPLICATION BY THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF GEORGETOWN TO DISPENSE WITH A VOTE OF THE ELECTORS

1. The Council of the Corporation of the Town of Georgetown intends to apply to the Ontario Municipal Board for approval to improve, pave and reconstruct certain roads in the Town of Georgetown at an estimated cost of \$356,500.

2. The following are the roads which are intended to be improved, paved and reconstructed:

Maple Avenue West from the town limits 2400 feet to Main Street; Tyers Avenue from Edward Street 800 ft. to Maple Avenue; Delrex Blvd. from Guelph St. to 300 ft. South of Chelvin Drive.

3. Application will be made to the Ontario Municipal Board for an order to dispense with the assent of the electors to the undertaking of the said works.

4. The Ontario Municipal Board may order pursuant to the statute that the assent of the electors shall not be required and may approve of the said works, but before doing so, it may appoint a time and place for a public hearing when any objections will be considered.

IT'S A WAY OF LIFE

Flying Bodies Fill the Air When Judo Class in Session

"Do you know what we do with bullies?" said Fred Daly, who teaches Judo every Monday night for the Georgetown and District Y. "We match them with a smaller guy who's better than they are. That humbles them!"

While he spoke, it seemed like a million children were running and falling, somersaulting in the air and tossing each other, all on a rug of red and blue mats on the floor of the high school gym.

"Judo is a way of life," he continued. "It teaches leadership, respect and courtesy. And it also needs a very quick mind. We encourage our kids to pay attention to their studies."

He interrupted himself to shout "Bravo!" to a group with

straight legs who were trying to touch the floor with first their hands, then their wrists, and finally their elbows. "Last week none of them could do that exercise," he said with pride. "Now look at them."

Suddenly he pointed to a youngster taking on a fellow twice his size. "When he started with us, he was so frightened he was almost sick. Now look at him!" The little fellow did a breakfall, rolled and came up laughing.

"You can see why we Judo instructors get so enthusiastic. We have some real champions in this group. My wife and I have driven some of them around to competitions and we've had winners! But busing them around is expensive. Their uniforms are expensive. "He paused wistfully, then perked up.

"One thing though the course isn't expensive."

To take Judo from Mr. Daly in a private club would cost parents anywhere from \$5- to \$20 for one month. To take Judo from Mr. Daly through the Georgetown & District Y costs parents \$40 for seven months.

"The Y is providing a great service to the community," he continued, "everyone benefits from taking Judo, whether they take it to become champions or just to improve their well being."

At 7 o'clock the whistle blew and nearly 60 children quickly and quietly took their positions around the mats. They tucked their legs beneath them, and they bowed.

Halton-Peel Manager J. A. Carroll Dies

John A. Carroll, manager of the Halton and Peel Trust company and former assistant deputy minister of the Ontario Department of Agriculture and Food, died Thursday morning in a car accident in Mississauga. He was 80.

With Mr. Carroll at the time was David Henry Laughlin, 74, another Halton Peel Trust official, who was also killed.

Mr. Carroll and Mr. Laughlin were on their way to the International Plowing matches in Paris, Ontario, when the car Mr. Carroll was driving was in collision with another car.

A third member in the Carroll car suffered cuts to his hands and face and was treated in hospital. Funeral services were held on Saturday.
