Pleasures of Possession Sorority Meeting Talk

Bodnar Urges School Board Introduce Pollution Course

Georgetown school board representative Ernie Bodnar urged the Halton County Board of Education, last week to introduce pollution control courses in county secondary schools next year.

He said this is being done now in the United States and he asked the board to "show leadership" in doing it here.

Pollution has become a major area of concern these days, and deserves special treatment in the schools, Bodnar said.

County school officials will look into it and report back to the board on the feasibility of introducing pollution control courses in the schools in 1970.

Assistant Mayor Doug Lawless noted geography courses currently in the secondary schools deals to some extent with pollution. Bodnar said he wants to leave it up to the administration to decide whether the pollution courses would be part of other courses such as science, or part of the school health program, or a course of its own.
