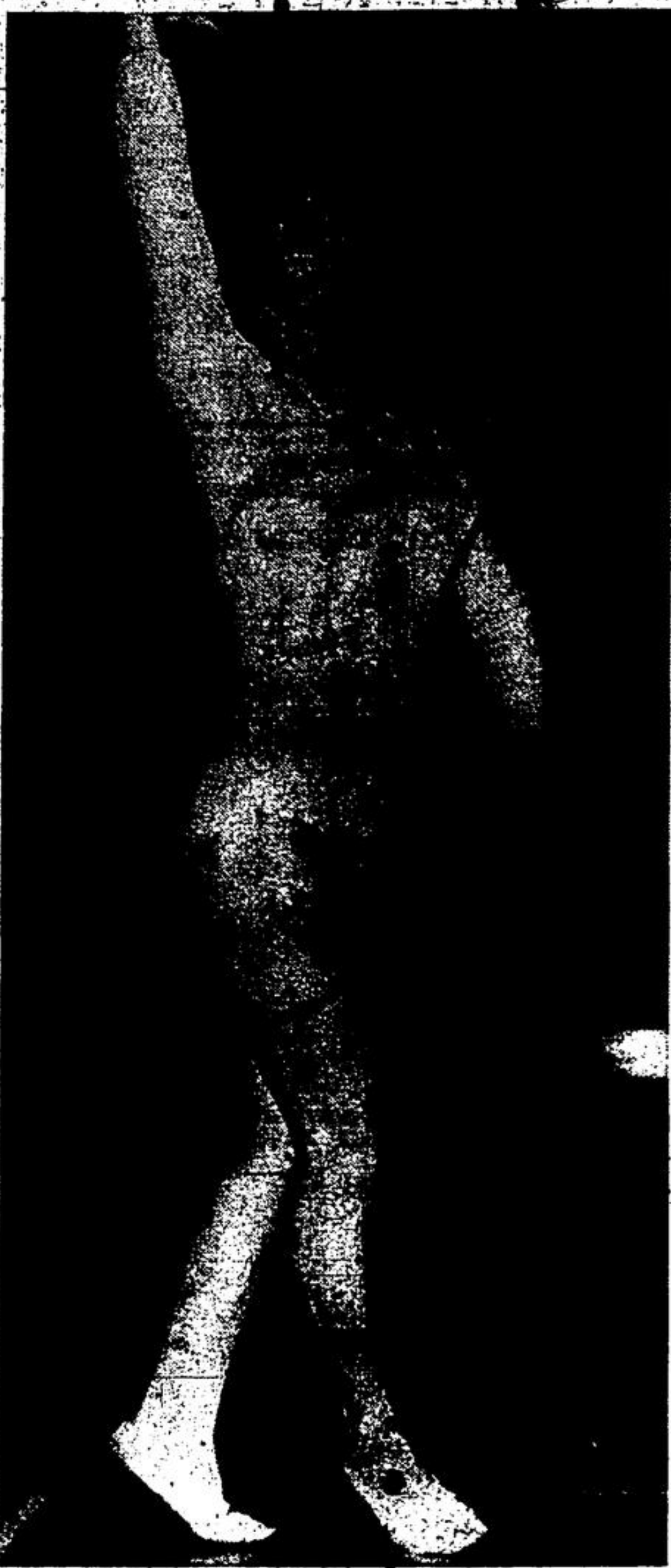


# German Gymnasts Join Y's Leader Training

"If I'm not allowed to win an Olympic medal for Canada, then I'll teach young Canadians who will!" Bernard Krudwig, gymnast, made this resolve in 1968 when he found he could not enter the Olympics in Mexico even though he qualified. Unfortunately he was still 6 months away from Canadian Citizenship.

On Tuesday evening, October 21, Bernard and his gymnast wife Anne-Marie began teaching the junior and senior leadership classes of the Georgetown & District Y.

"We're really very fortunate to get this wonderful pair," said Jo Lister, program director of the Y. "Look at their experience and their awards!"

Bernard Krudwig won local award after local award in his native Germany until he eventually qualified for the Junior Championships. In this competition, he came second.

He and his wife moved to Canada in 1963 and in 1964 he won the Ontario Gymnast Championship. From 1965 to 1967 he filled his trophy cupboard with winnings from gymnastic competitions all over Canada and the United States. In 1967 he became Gold Medalist — Canadian Senior Champion.

After missing out on the Olympics due to that 6 month technicality, he associated him-

self with the East York Recreational Association and the Harmony Club. In one of his classes, word-spread of his ability and the enrolment jumped from 24 to 150. He coached a team of four boys who are now the present champion junior team of Ontario. As well, these four East York boys have won individual awards.

Not everyone taking gymnastics wants to become champions. The children in the Georgetown Y leadership classes want to become Y teaching assistants—but then who knows? This leadership program is put on without charge for those junior Y members who have shown the interest and ability to become leaders. Their ages range from 12 to 18.

The Y's regular gym teachers have also become pupils in the Krudwigs' class. Irwin Schandelmeyer, Tom Dean, and Dorothy Gillespie felt they could learn much to help their own teaching skills.

"I was going to take a refresher gymnastic course in Toronto," said Mrs. Gillespie. "But where could I find better instructors than right here?"

The Krudwigs have just moved into the Georgetown area and are looking forward to their association with the Georgetown and District Y.

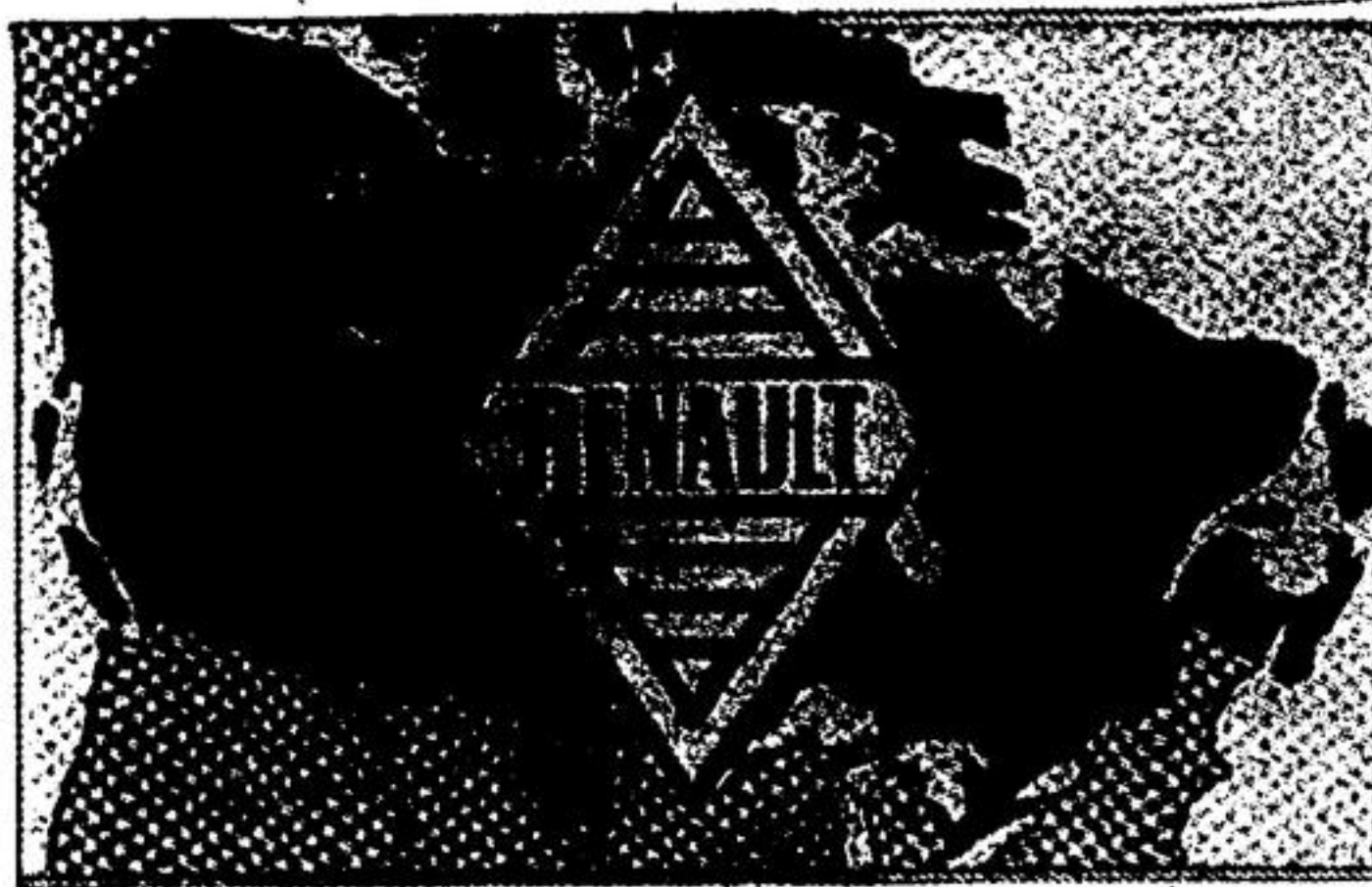
