### SUPPORTS NEW GOVERNMENT REGULATION

Dear Sir:

We are delighted with the Ontario Government's new regulation permitting employees, who are hired on or after October 26, and who object "on the basis of religious or moral convictions" to paying dues to the Civil Service Association of Ontario, to have the equivalent of such dues remitted to a registered charity. This legislative action constitutes an important step forward in our efforts to have full freedom of association extended to all and every form of compulsory unionism abolished.

Let's hope that the Government will have the courage of political conviction to ensure that this new legal privilege of civil servants will also be granted to the thousands of workers who presently are captive supporters of secular union to whose social and political views they are entirely opposed.

Eventually Ontario should have legislation safeguarding man's God-given right to work in freedom and allowing him to support the trade union of his own choosing and not someone else's.
