## LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

Here is a tricky hand that caused at least one declarer some trouble last week at the Acton Bridge Club. South dealt with neither side vulnerable.

NORTH  
S-8 5 4  
H-10 6 3  
D-K Q 2  
C-Q 10 6 3

WEST EAST  
S-K 7 S-J 10 9 6 2  
H-Q H-9 8 5 4  
D-J 10 8 6 5 D-9 7  
C-A K 9 4 2 C-J 5

SOUTH  
S-A Q 3  
H-A K J 7 2  
D-A 4 3  
C-8 7

The bidding:  
SOUTH WEST NORTH EAST  
1 H 2 C 2 H Pass  
4 H All Pass

Opening lead: King of clubs. North felt that he had enough points to make one bid after West had overcalled two clubs.

Perhaps since two of these were the club queen and also since his hand is flat or balanced (no ruffing value) maybe North should pass. South could have temoized with a three heart call but there is little to fault with the actual bid of 4 hearts.

After West led the club king, East wisely did not signal for a continuation. West switched to the jack of diamonds. Declarer should win this in his hand. Dummy is short of entries and the diamond king and queen must be preserved for the time being.

Declarer should cash one heart just in case. In this case the precaution pays off for West. Declarer can now extract all East's hearts ending up in the South hand. A low club puts West on the spot. If he plays his ace, declarer will win the balance of the tricks. West should concede a club trick since he knows that either declarer or his partner has the yet

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unplayed club jack. However it doesn't matter since declarer will still make his game contract. Even if at the beginning West takes the ace and king of clubs and gives his partner a ruff, declarer can still make the contract provided he takes one high trump before he tries any trump finesse. With sufficient entries, declarer should always cash one high trump before finessing for the queen.

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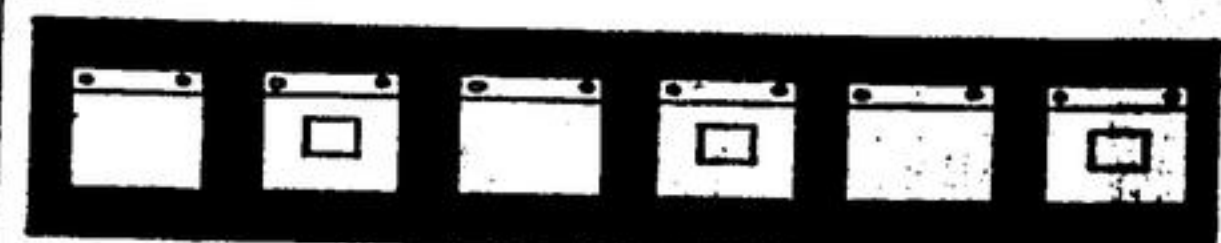
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
