Cl' Barney Accounted For Many Rabbit Pies

My father, Charlie Hoare, went to work in the lower paper mill when he was 12 years old. He probably bought his first hound dog when he was 18 years of age. It died of distemper. Later on he bought two more hounds, they also died of distemper.

I still remember how he tried to save them. He would place some cloth in a pail, pour some liquid on it and light it. After the flame was put out it would smoke. My job was to hold the pail, while father held the dog's head in it. It never did cure the disease but they did get some relief.

Finally Ray Kercher came up from Valleyfield, Quebec, with a black and tan hound. It was unlike any other dog he had had before.

"This is a good dog," Ray said. "I won't take a penny for him. I know you will be good to him. Dad and Ray agreed that Barney would be a good name for him. Later on in years we called him O' Barney.

There wasn't much to hunt in those days except rabbits, partridge and a few fox. To describe O' Barney, his ears were very long and wide, his legs short and sturdy, his body heavy set. One would assume that he was a cross between a fox hound and a basset. His voice was like music to a hunter's ears, especially along the side of the hills in the lower Credit Valley.

O' Barney really never emitted a bark. His voice was a long howl except when he was close to the game, then it changed to a triple tongue. He would yodel that rabbit right into my dad's gun sight. Usually, my father would bag at least 3 and then we would head for home. He would say "rabbit pie Monday night, son." My mouth watered.

My mother, Ida May Kelly, whom my father married when he was quite young, always had the worst job of all to do. The cleaning job. She never complained, regardless of how bad the bunnies were shot up. They were let soak in water with vinegar and salt with the water changed twice. Monday afternoon she would boil them. Of course, they were cut up, two back pieces and the four legs for each one. After they boiled for some time she would add the chopped potatoes, carrots, etc. When the vegetables were done the meat was still intact on the bones. Everything was then poured into large pan, a cup was placed in the centre upside down, then the pie crust, almost one half inch thick, was placed on top and like a dumpling on the under side. We each were served a piece of pie crust upside down with vegetables on top and

lots of rabbit. We always praised mother for providing such a good supper.

More about O' Barney in a later column. Such as how he survived after being hit by the six o'clock flyer on the iron bridge. How he ran 11 bunnies into Bill Tuck's gun in a single day. How did he ever find his way home from Limehouse? and how Art Speight and I found him at Speyside. He died at the age of 13 years. He was a free dog. And never ever did get distemper.

ASKS PRINCE TO OPEN LITTLE NHL HALL OF FAME

Your Majesty:
The Little N.H.L. provides organized and supervised hockey for boys of the ages 8 to 13 inclusive and in Ontario, Canada there are over 50,000 boys registered.

In 1972, the Little N.H.L. is instituting a Little N.H.L. Hockey Hall of Fame in Georgetown, Ontario where this Hockey League originated in 1938. Georgetown is 30 miles west of Toronto, Ontario.

The reason of my writing this letter is to issue a special invitation to H.R.H. Prince Charles, Prince of Wales to be our honoured guest and to open officially the Little N.H.L. Hockey Hall of Fame in March 1972. This Hall of Fame will be the first of its kind in the world.

We shall be most pleased to receive your affirmative answer.

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FISH TUG TRAWLS OFF TORONTO HARBOUR

The sturdy, 78 foot fish tug 'Leola Charles' has been trawling in Lake Ontario just off the Toronto water front since September and will be working there for several October weeks. These trawling operations, under contract with the provincial government, are being carried out on an experimental basis to determine if enough fish remain in the lake to warrant the establishment of a profitable tug fishery.

Large, open trawl nets are towed about 300 feet behind the tug at a depth of 60 feet for about 30 minutes and then hauled in. Off Toronto, each haul netted about 1,100 pounds of smelt and alewife.

This large quantity of fish is dumped on deck and sorted out according to size and species. The alewife are packed in separate boxes while the smelt are graded into three different sizes. The smelt (some over ten inches long) and alewife are sold to dealers to be canned as pet food.

When the tug trawled at the east end of Lake Ontario other species such as whitefish, bass, perch, etc., were caught in lighted numbers.

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
