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#### FISH TUG TRAWLS OFF TORONTO HARBOUR

The sturdy, 78 foot fish tug Leola Charles' has been trawling in Lake Ontario just off the Toronto water front since September and will be working there for several October weeks. These trawling operations, under contract with the provincial government, are being carried out-on an experimental basis to determine if enough fish remain in the lake to warrant the establishment of a profitable tug fishery.

Large, open trawl nets are towed about 300 feet behind the tug at a depth of 60 feet for about 30 minutes and then bulled in. Off Toronto, each haul netted about 1,100 pounds of smelt and alewife.

This large quantity of fish is dumped on deck and sorted out according to size and species. The alewife are packed in separate boxes while the smelt are graded into three different sizes. The smelt (some over ten inches long) and ale wife are sold to dealers to be canned as pet food.

When the tug trawled, at the east end of Lake Ontario other species such as whitefish, bass, perch, etc., were caught in limited numbers.
