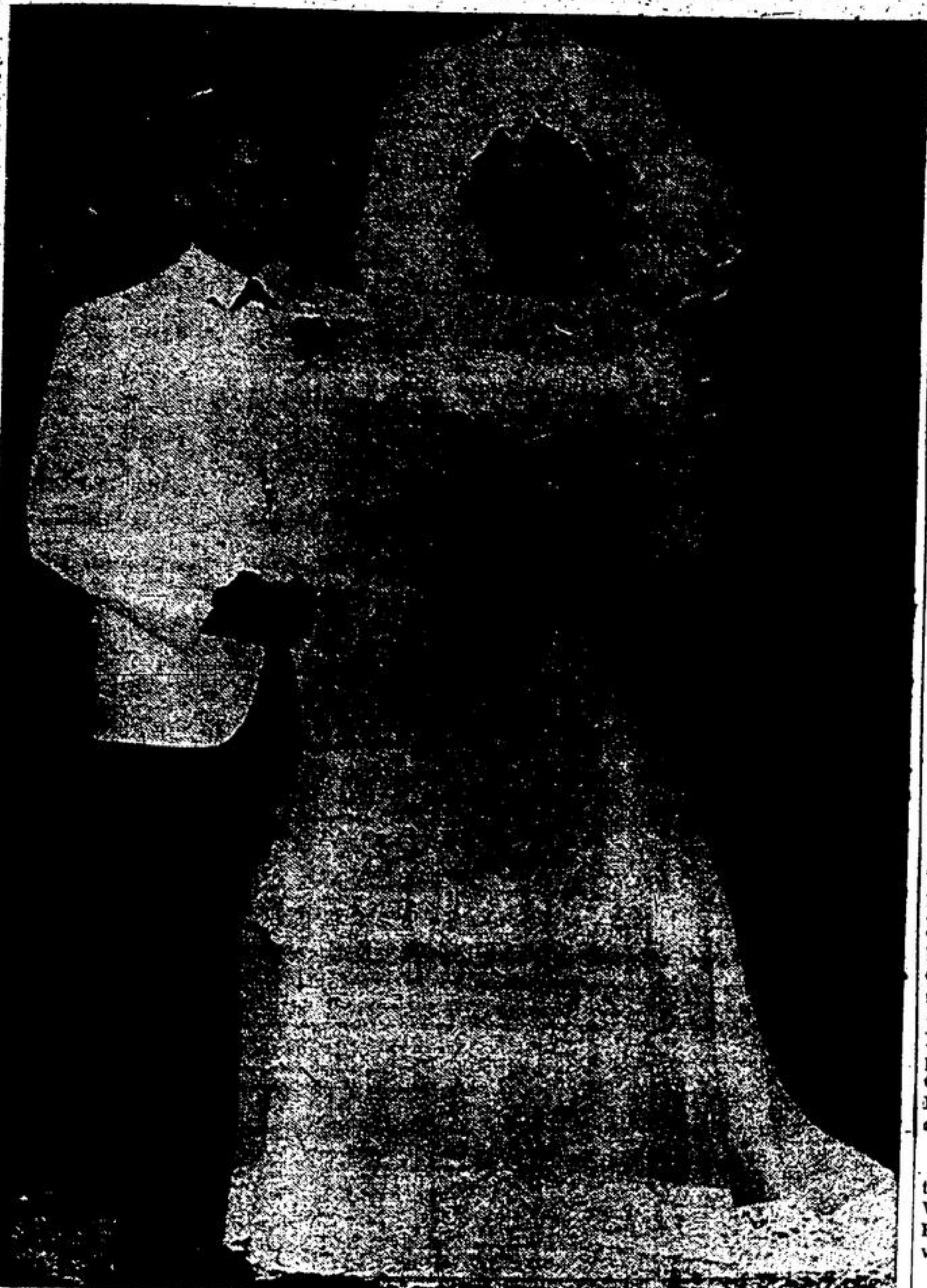

A suggestion that Acton annex a part of Esquesing, known as Prospect Park, on Fairy Lake was noted and filed by Esquesing council, Monday night. Beardmore and Co., plan to make a wild life centre in the area, and Acton feels it is reasonable that it should be within Acton's boundaries.

Curiosity about activity on the Donald Matthews farm, recently sold, again brought a delegation to council. The reve told him he knew nothing about it, but the clerk said a building permit for a 1,440 square foot garage had been taken out by a man named G. C. Bistro, of Agincourt.

North dealt with neither side vulnerable.

Perhaps it is the aggressive nature of duplicate players but every pair that held these north-south hands ended up in three no trump. Their optimism paid off when all but one managed to gather in nine tricks.

South's bid of one no trump over a one club opener promises 9 to 11 high card points.

Declarer led a heart to the king, which East declined to take. The diamond eight was led and held the trick. Another diamond was led and the finesse repeated. This time West had to win. As predicted, West was reluctant to continue clubs. He led a spade which declarer won in dummy. This was necessary and the spade queen is the only sure entry to declarer's hand.

After cashing the diamond king, declarer led a high heart. East won and returned the club nine. All West could do was win his ace and ten of clubs and concede the balance of the tricks to declarer.
