Twenty-six persons attended the Red Cross Friendly Visiting Training program at Cedarvale Community Centre on Wednesday, November 5. The course was conducted by Mrs. C. S. Kennedy vice chairman services for Seniors of the Ontario division. She was assisted by Mrs. L. F. Anderson, chairman and Miss Helen Parsons.

The morning session included the film 'The Rights of Age' which depicted the hardships encountered by an older person living by herself.

Following the discussions covered such topics as Understanding the older person, Importance of visiting, Qualities of a good visitor, Services a friendly visitor can give.

A variety of subjects including Special Disabilities of older people and how a visitor can face these were covered in the afternoon. Training in actual visiting was portrayed in the form of a role play.

The group were given instructions on Recreational Therapy as a means of motivating older people. Included were crafts and conditioning for fun and fitness.

Special emphasis was placed on the right approach and procedures when visiting.

The film 'The Breath of Life' was an excellent presentation of the mouth to mouth resuscitation method of rescue breathing.

Board Examining Religious Education, Asks For Briefs

A detailed examination of the McKay report on religious education in schools is already under study by the Halton Board of Education's ad hoc committee on religious education. It was reported last week.

The committee, which was formed only last month, has invited interested parents to submit briefs.

The briefs must deal directly with the McKay report and its major recommendations as they apply to Halton County, it was pointed out.

Briefs will be reviewed until January 31, 1970.

Palmer pointed out that preliminary discussion indicated that key questions which the committee must consider are: Is the present program in the schools satisfactory? If not, with what should it be replaced? In the event of a new program being adopted, what teacher training should be undertaken?

As an additional aid, the committee is seeking sample briefs on the McKay report from various sources.

The committee is composed of 18 persons from Halton County ranging from senior education

officials to a Grade 8 student. It was formed after some county residents demanded the board abolish compulsory religious instruction in the schools.

The committee has scheduled meetings on November 25, December 2, December 16 and January 6.
