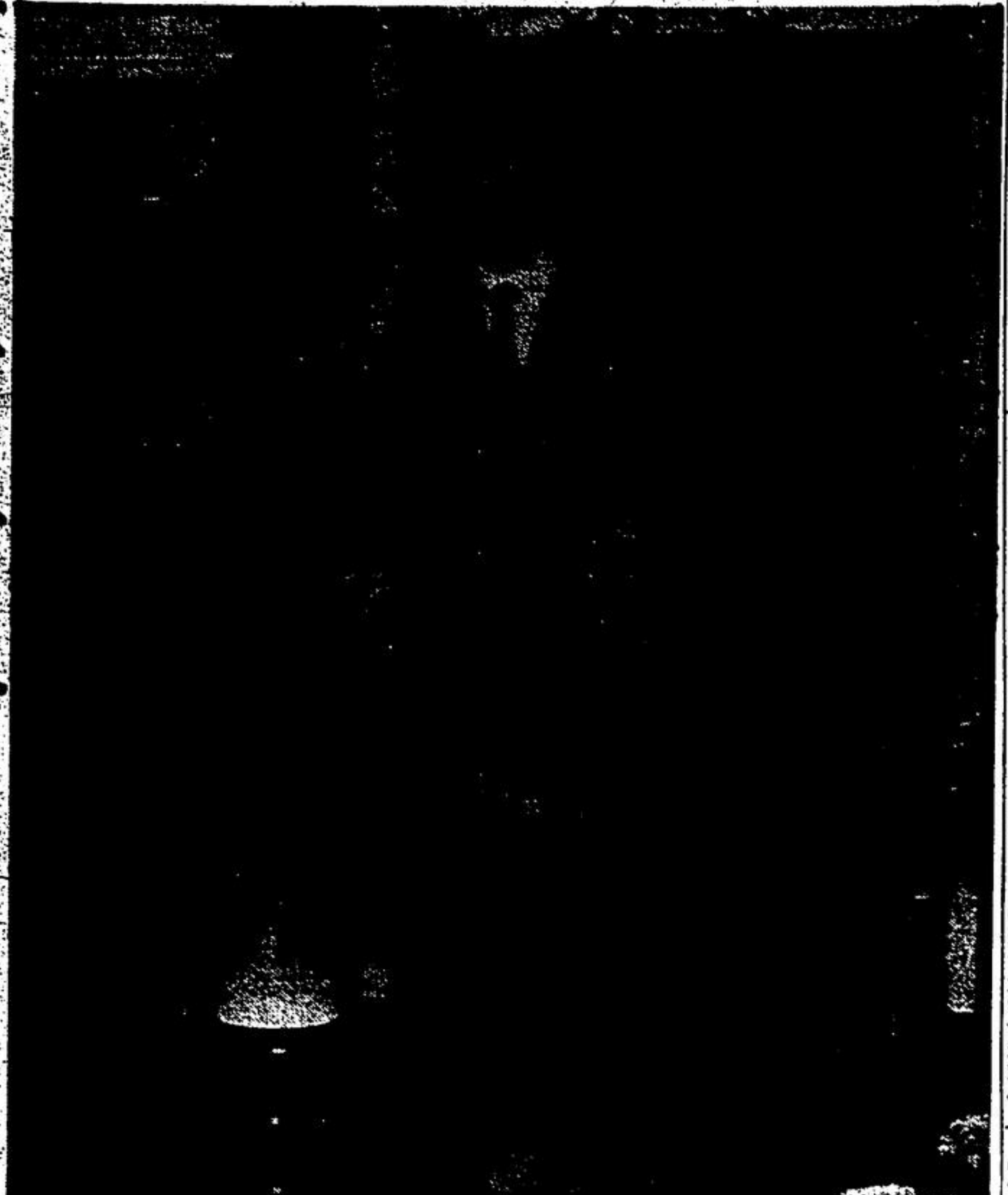


New Florist is Fourth Generation in Business

Lawyers Complain, Seek Better Court Facilities

The president of the Halton County Law Association this week attacked the inadequate Family and Juvenile Court building in Milton and said he will ask the association to demand "quick remedy" from the attorney-general's department.

Every time a Halton grand jury makes its customary inspection of the county court facilities in Milton, the county seat, it condemns the Family Court building as being inadequate.

The last report said the overcrowded conditions make it "intolerable." The court is next to the equally-condemned century old Halton County jail.

Langdon said approaching region: 1 government, Wishart's excuse for not improving the court facilities in Milton immediately, is no excuse whatsoever.

"It has nothing to do with regional government" the lawyer said this week in his Georgetown office.

"The administration of justice is a provincial matter."

"There is a crying need for more facilities there" said Georgetown lawyer Ken Langdon.

The attack against the Family Court is the latest in a series which have included blasts by grand juries and in the Ontario Legislature.

The county law association represents 80 lawyers in Halton. Langdon said the issue will go on the agenda for the next meeting and members will be asked to set out their dissatisfaction of the Family Court facilities for Attorney General Arthur Wishart.

Waiting Room

The waiting room of the Family Court is packed to overflowing and people are jammed into the corridors on the two court days a week, Langdon said. There is no place for clients to confer with their lawyer, he added.

The lawyer's father, Judge Kenneth M. Langdon, is the judge of the county Family and Juvenile court. Judge Langdon is also senior provincial judge in the county.

Law Association president Langdon said the case load at the Family Court is entirely too much for one judge to handle.

"Therefore he must dispense justice quickly," said Langdon.

Langdon's criticism follows a blast in the Ontario Legislature two weeks ago by Dr. Morton Shulman (NDP — High Park).

Bad Way

Shulman rapped Wishart for "the bad way justice is being dispensed in Halton County."
