Raiders Shoot Down Jets Meet Elmira Fri. & Sun.

Georgetown Raiders, looking stronger each time out, scored five times in the third period to fashion a 7-4 victory over Lucan Jets in an Intermediate B game in Georgetown Memorial Arena, Sunday afternoon.

All seven Georgetown goals were scored by former Junior C Raiders Jack Gudgeon set the pace with three, Terry Lane fired a pair, and Wayne Davison and Paul Robinson notched the rest.

Robinson, who had the league scoring crown at his fingertips when he was suspended by the OHA near the end of last season, rejoined the club last week after working out with Oakville Seniors briefly.

His return, plus the addition of Ron Lane and Bill 'Hummer' Dwyer, brought to eight the number of ex-Junior Cs in the lineup. Goalie Brian Peavoy is the other.

Lucan's snipers were Bell, Nairn, Alois and Hassack. Lucan owned a 2-1 edge at the end of the first period and had a 3-2 advantage going into the third period when Raiders turned the tables.

Georgetown momentum shows up in the shots on goal. The teams were even with nine apiece in the first period, but Raiders outshot Lucan 14-8 in the middle stanza, and 18 to 6 in the last frame.

Blake Inglis assisted on three and Davison on two. Others picking up assist points in the Georgetown cause were Wilson, Gudgeon, Dwyer, Terry Lane, Doucette and Lucas.

Raiders picked up 10 of the 17 penalties but Lucan's Rick Bradford gave his team the edge in penalty minutes. Minutes after serving a slashing penalty in the first period he drew a major and topped the tantrum

Gerry Herman, who scored two on the night.

Dale Rahn and Jim Aitken also scored two apiece for the Huskies. The remaining two were netted by Ike Piche and Murray Stephens.

Raiders next two games are against Elmira. They play away Friday night and at home Sunday afternoon.

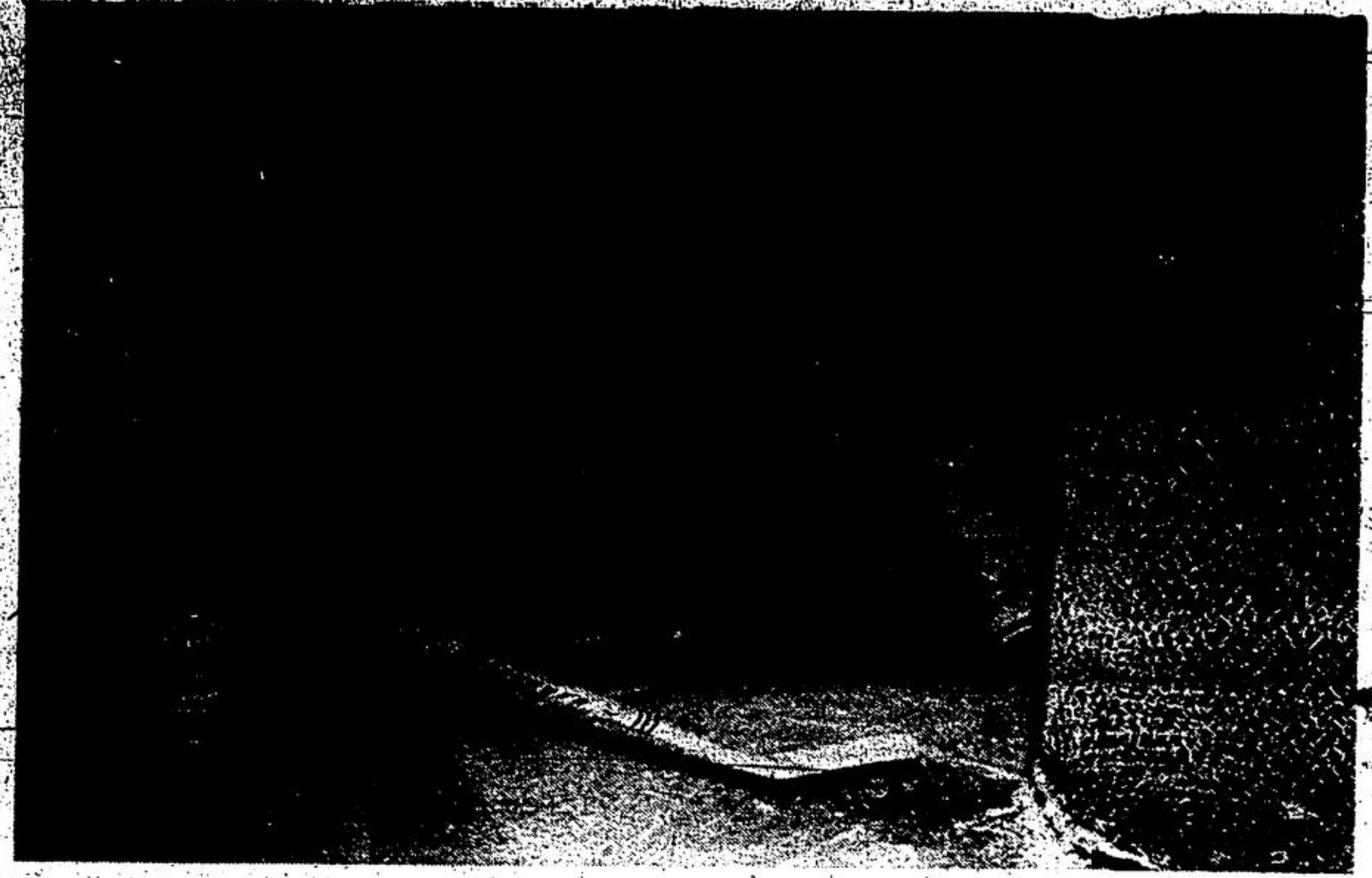

COHOES IN NOTTAWASAGA RIVER
Bill McMullen of Acton hooked and landed an 11 lb. coho salmon in the Nottawasaga River recently on a Mepps spinner. His companion landed a 13 lb. pickerel. It was caught on a minnow. Two nice ones to say the least. (The Oxbow rapids on the river was the hot spot.)

KOKANEE'S IN MAD RIVER
Cohos have provided recent thrills for many anglers and now kokanee salmon are appearing in unexpected waters.

Conservation officer F. B. Bowes received a telephone call on October 7 from a resident in the Glencairn area of Lake Simcoe Forest District about some bright red fish in the Mad River. Upon investigating, officer Bowes found the location, one mile west of Glencairn, Con. 1 Lot 33, Toronton Twp. and identified the fish as kokanee.

These fish were first observed by local residents early in October and as many as 10 fish had been seen at one time. At the time of the October 7 sighting there were six fish occupying two spawning beds located in two feet of water on gravelly shoals from 4 to 5 sq. feet in size.

**MORE ABOUT THE SEA-
OTTER**
Sea otter spend most of their time floating on their backs, sleeping, swimming, and eating. They dive possibly to 300 feet and return to the surface to eat the food they collect.

When eating mollusks with heavy shells, sea otter commonly bring a flat rock to the surface with the mollusk, lay the rock on their chest, and break the shell against the rock.

When not in deep water the sea otter prefer shallow, rock strewn coasts, and often crawl out of water onto rocks.
