Hospital Space Dwindles Emergency Visits Soar

The rate of occupancy and number of emergency visits at Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital continue to creep upward.

Figures released this week on the hospital's operation in October and for the first ten months of the year show that patient space is dwindling.

The average over all rate of occupancy this year to the end of October was 80.2 per cent compared to 75 per cent for the same period last year.

When broken down by type of accommodation the occupancy figures are: medical and surgical ward 80.5 per cent; maternity ward 35 per cent; and children's ward 81 per cent.

The very low rate of occupancy in the maternity ward pulls down the over all per centage figure and makes the accommodation picture appear rosier than it actually is.

Hospital boards like to keep the maximum occupancy rate of any ward at about 80 per cent.

Emergency visits for October totalled 435 which is 90 more than the total for October '68. By years the total in 69 to the end of October was 4,040 while for the same period in '68 it was 2,839.
