the fair, as were items on the sewing and fancy goods stall.

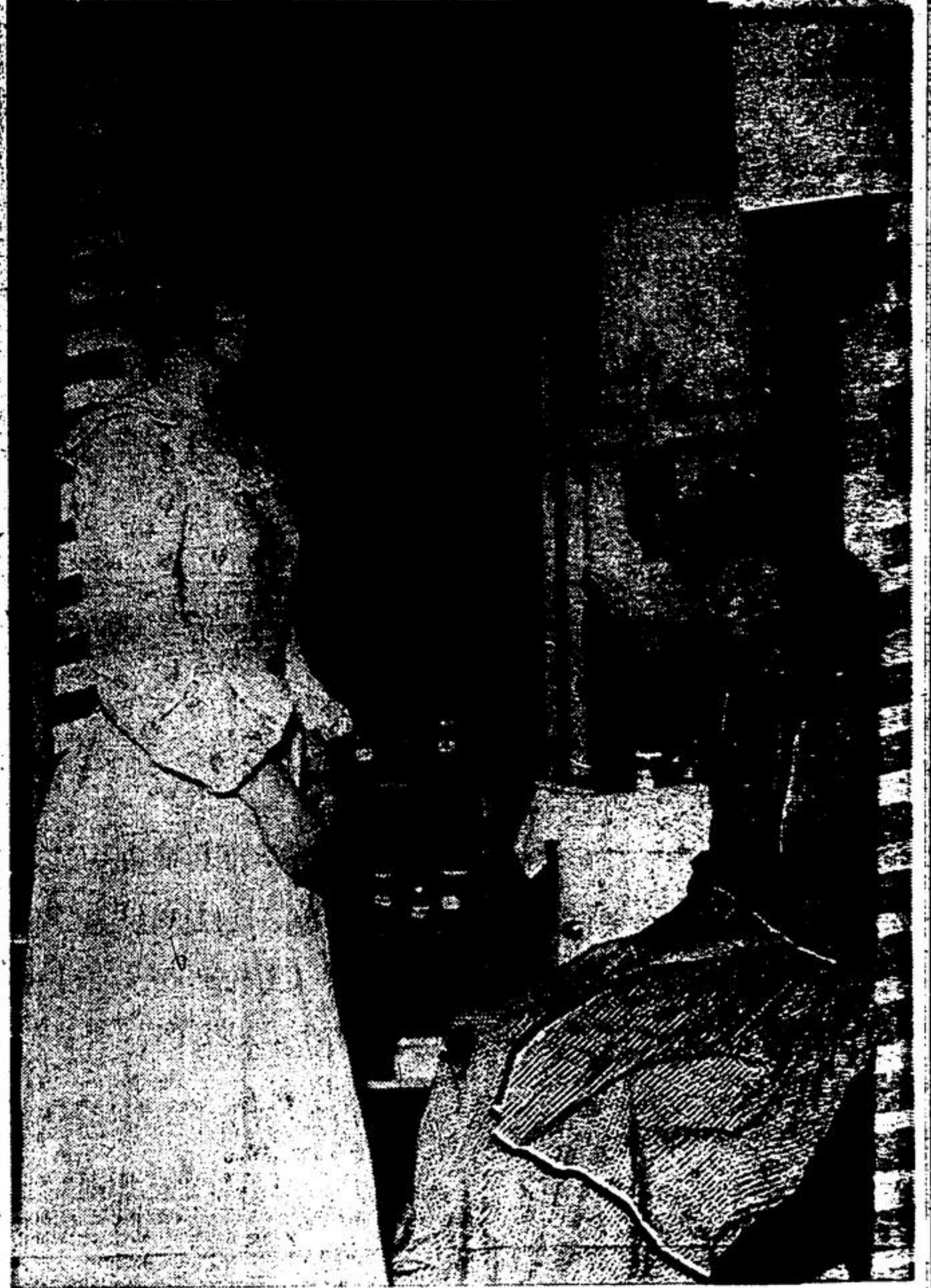

Age Specific Death Rates for all Cancer in Canada

Except for the first decade of life mortality from all sites of cancer increases steadily with age.

There is a minor peak before five years of age after which the death rate declines to a lowest point at age 10-14 years. The rate nearly doubles before age 20 and then rises more rapidly between ages 30 and 55. At the older ages the rate of increase falls off but some increase with age is still evident. This pattern by age is found in both males and females but between ages 30 and 50 death rates are higher for women than for men.
