Today's Churches Selling False Worship Says J.W.

John F. MacPherson, district supervisor of Jehovah's Witnesses, issued a stunning rebuke over the weekend to all forms of false religion. He was speaking to a capacity audience of 1,458 at final sessions of the semi-annual circuit assembly in Bramford.

According to Mr. MacPherson it is not God's intention to permit false forms of worship to be practiced indefinitely, but to see to their removal from earth's scene.

Members of the Georgetown congregation attended the three day convention. Many viewed proceedings via closed circuit television which transmitted the entire program to an auxiliary auditorium where overflow seating was set up.

A highlight of the assembly was a baptism ceremony at which 23 ministers submitted to total water immersion in official recognition of their ordination.

Among the local program participants was presiding minister, Melville Taylor, who presided as chairman over the Saturday evening sessions.

Attracting the peak attendance however, was the public lecture "True Worship Versus the False" delivered by Mr. MacPherson. He cited age old differences between true and false forms of worship, noting sharp modern day distinctions between the two.

May Hop Councils

Lawson Charges Marshall Breaking Faith with Voters

In an unprecedented move, Monday night, William Lawson as a nominator of Ken Marshall last year, when he ran for office in Esqueusing, publicly called him to account for his action in running for deputy reeve of Milton, while halfway through his term of office as Esqueusing councillor.

The complete text of his address was as follows: "It has been reported in the press that Cr. Marshall would happily trade his seat on Esqueusing council for a seat on Milton council. As the person who nominated Mr. Marshall last Dec. I am most disappointed that he has broken faith with the electors of Esqueusing Township by accepting a nomination to Milton council and feel that the Esqueusing electors deserve an explanation.

"It is reported by Cr. Marshall that he has sold his farm, however my information from Mr. Marshall in earlier conversation is that the sale of his farm is conditional upon the approval of its use for a controversial car race track.

TURNED BACK

"One would then observe that Mr. Marshall will be considering a new residence. To be ineligible to retain his seat on the Esqueusing council this residence would have to be more than 5 miles from Esqueusing Township while being a property owner in Esqueusing. The question then arises has Cr. Marshall turned his back on Esqueusing ratepayers on the strength of a conditional sale, or does the prestige of a seat in Milton prove more attractive?

"If the residence situation makes Mr. Marshall ineligible for Esqueusing then the electors of Milton should know if Mr. Marshall plans to reside in Burlington, Oakville or Milton?
