Costs Nix Middle School Proposals

The swelling protests by taxpayers over the spiralling cost of education caused Halton County Board of Education last week to scrap plans to change the teacher-student ratio and to install elaborate audio-visual teaching aids in its new middle schools.

Middle schools may replace senior schools in the county and three will open on a trial basis next year.

Trustee John Price had suggested the new schools should have more teachers in proportion to students and be equipped with the best in audio visual aids. He also suggested that one-third of the teachers should hold university degrees.

Board chairman Fred Armistage said the cost would be too high and added that teachers should not be paid more than themselves trained or educated, teachers in the same grades in regular schools.

Tarzwell Herd Dispersal Brings Excellent Prices for Holsteins

Prices paid at the dispersal sale of the Holstein herd of Howard Tarzwell of Georgetown, averaged the second highest for a sale of this type in Canada this year.

The herd sold for a total of \$234,200 at the Hays Sales Arena on Highway 5, west of the 7th Line. The 140 lots averaged \$1,572 each.

Tarzwell said this week he hasn't decided if he will purchase other cattle and remain in the business. He said the sale disposed of every head of cattle he owned.

Highest price from the sale was \$15,000 paid by Luis Horacio de Mello of Sao Paulo Brazil, for the six year old herd sire Romandale Maple Toro. De Mello bought 18 head.

Top price for a female was \$13,500 paid by Eugene Vesely

Lapeer, Michigan, for the excellent cow, Hilton Texal Reflection Lady, a daughter of the noted Superior Type Sire, Roeland Reflection Sovereign. Vesely also paid \$9,000 for another Excellent daughter of the same sire and \$1,200 for her baby calf. He also bought a Very Good cow with three direct Excellent dams at \$5,600.

Claude Pickett, Georgetown, Ontario, paid \$10,000 for a five month old daughter of the \$13,500 top price cow, sired by the famed Romandale Reflection Marquis. Romandale Farms Unionville, bought a four year old Marquis daughter at \$9,000 and three other members of her immediate family at \$4,000, \$3,500, and \$2,100.

J. M. Fraser of Spring Farms Streetsville, Ont. paid \$12,600 for the six year old Excellent

cow, Fairlea Wayne Reward and three of her descendants. The cow brought \$7,000, her 2 year old daughter \$3,100 and heifer calves from these two \$1,400 and \$1,100.

Amongst the 51 head sold for export were purchases by Italian, Brazilian and Mexican buyers as well as the USA.

Sixty one brought at least \$1,000 and 23 topped the \$2,000 figure. Six bulls averaged \$2,787; 79 milking females \$1,715; 22 bred heifers \$1,042; 22 open yearlings \$1,164; and 17 heifer calves \$1,032.

M.O.H. Wants Authority Council Gives it to Him

Acting medical officer of health for Halton County, Dr. Ian Hunter of Milton, has told county council, there's "confusion and misunderstanding throughout the Halton health unit."

This is "due to lack of a clearcut chain of command," Health Board Chairman Reeve Anne MacArthur reported to council.

Dr. Hunter "wishes it understood" council heard, "that if he is to continue as health unit director and MOH, he must have authority to handle unit matters as he feels best for the organization."

HOLDING BY-LAW FREEZES LAND USE

Esqueusing Township council last week passed a holding by-law to regulate the use of land and the erection and use of buildings or structures in the township.

The by-law will prevent the use of land or buildings or structures in the township for any other purpose than the one existing.

Development will be allowed to take place within village boundaries, however.
