Get Involved, Make Decisions Challenge at Teacher Conference

Consultants and co-ordinators should return to the classroom every three years, without such a return being considered a demotion, A. W. Jeffries, a teacher at Oakville-Trafalgar High School, told a press conference called by the executive of Halton branch of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation, in Oakville last Wednesday.

He claimed a large gap between the teaching and administrative salaries did not permit the best education policy, and called for the Board and teachers to sit down together to try and work out such a system.

Can't Take Part

Robert Whitely of Nelson High School in Burlington, urged that teachers be given a greater opportunity of assessing the education system. "How can we defend and maintain it if we do not have the opportunity to take part in decisions," he asked. He pointed out that North York allocates 10 times more than Halton County for professional funds.

Keith Wallace, a teacher at Thomas Blakelock High School complained that classes are too large in some schools, and suggested they be trimmed to a maximum of 30. He said few people question most of the recommendations of the Hall-Dennis report, but suitable pupil-teacher ratios must be maintained to reflect the report. "We must get the idea across that the Hall-Dennis report is not the savior of education at this time," he maintained. He concluded by suggesting the community must make the decision.

More Involved

Branch president Paul Martindale, of Acton High School, challenged teachers to become more involved and "give up your evenings." He stated the executive endorses experimental schools such as Lord Elgin, and emphasized they want more experimentation. "In any big organization, the people at the bottom do not get enough support," he stated, and went on to express concern that consultants become isolated from education.

The president stressed that teachers should be more involved in the decision making process and endorsed a plan of action calling for more student-oriented high schools, the raising of status and salaries for teachers, the "turning on" of parents and school trustees, and bringing life problems into the class room.

In referring to an internal working paper which president

Paul Martindale claimed should never have been released to the press, he emphasized the complaints were not those of the federation, but only the views of some teachers.

Teachers Like Puppets

Among the many complaints listed in the internal working paper was a statement that "teachers are manipulated like puppets by the Halton County Board of Education." It further charged that it would appear the objective in Halton County is to reduce the status

of the teacher, and elevate the status of the administrator.

The release went on to complain of the lack of secretarial help in the school, and "regretted the loss of a superb substitute-leave plan in exchange for a tight-fisted alternative."

At the conclusion of the meeting the executive of the O.S.S.T.F. issued a formal statement saying the working paper was published without consultation with the president of the Halton Division or any member of its executive.

Study Abstract Thinking to Aid Learning Disabilities

Halton's elementary schools have been chosen for a special study of the development of abstract thinking of children.

Dr. Linda S. Siegel from the psychiatry department of McMaster University was given permission to conduct the study at last Thursday's meeting of the Halton County Board of Education.

The plan is to compare the ability of children with learning disabilities and children who are progressing normally in school on tasks which involve the understanding of abstract concepts. If children with learning disabilities use less efficient strategies, a variety of procedures will be used in an attempt to improve their problem solving ability. Approximately 10 classes of students with learning disabilities and an equal number of children from regular grades will be required for the study. The tasks take approximately 15 to 20 minutes, and each child is seen individually.

Parents will be consulted before the project begins and Dr. Siegel's report will be available to the board, trustees were assured.

Rare Blood Available From Ottawa Storehouse

Most of us think of our Blood Group as O, A, B or AB and either Rh positive or negative and we know it is usable up to 21 days after we donate it. We don't realize that there are over a dozen other grouping systems in that complex material that is our blood.

Blood, like everything else today, can be frozen and when stored at 80 degrees below zero centigrade, will keep for 2 or 3 years. But because it is a very costly and complicated procedure, it is impractical for everyday use. However, rare blood groups can be treated in this way and a National Bank of about 100 rare blood groups is stored in the Rare Blood Section of the National Defence Medical Centre in Ottawa. The list of rare donors in Canada is kept at the Red Cross National Laboratories in Toronto and is available for International use.

The next blood donor clinic in Georgetown will be in Holy Cross Auditorium, December 8.
