After a blood donation has been completed, the donor will often ask "What happens to my ISSUE QUARTER blood now?" The donor's unit of blood is refrigerated as soon as possible and should be kept under constant refrigeration from this time until it is transfused into a patient. The type of refrigeration will vary along the way, from the time the blood is being transported in the refrigerated truck back to the depot laboratory, stored in refrigerated rooms in the depot, delivered in refrigerated insulated boxes to the hospital, and finally in hospital blood bank refrigerators.

The reason for this vigilance is to ensure that the various elements of blood will remain in the best possible condition, so that when the blood is transfused, the patient receiving this unit will derive maximum benefit from the blood.

The day following the clinic. a team of especially trained technologists from the depot sets up a battery of tests on each sample of blood, a minimum of 10 separate tests are done each sample and all the results are checked by another technologist. These tests take approximately 4 to 5 hours and provide much valuable inform

In addition, information about other blood factors will be obtained also. When the labor atory staff is satisfied with the results of the tests, the units of blood are examined visually properly labelled and pronounced suitable to be issued to the hospitals.

After the blood has arrived at the hospital, units are selva ected on the basis of the blood group and Rh and tests are done between the blood of the patient and the blood of the unit: these tests are done to ensure a safe 'match' which will guarantee that the blood wil' give maximum benefit to the patient.


