A new Georgetown high school newspaper, "Embryo" made its debut last month. This is the third high school newspaper to come into being in

the last five years. The others were "The Gadfly," "The Harold" and now the "Embryo." Most of them have fallen by the wayside from lack of money.

The staff of the "Embryo" are cutting costs by having only the outside cover and the centre fold printed, the remainder mimeographed.

The staff consists of editor-in-chief David Warren, associate editors Bruce Holder and Marty Miles, art director Paul Dorsey, layout director Liz Catling, and business manager Maureen Clarke.

Predeceased by his first wife Helen Colby, he leaves his wife Lucille Sedore Tweedy whom he married in 1965; four chil-

dren, Mrs. R. Guest (Orlo) and Michael of Glen Williams, Mrs. F. Currie (Maxine) and Mrs. G. Robertson (Judith) of Georgetown, a stepson Ronald Tweedy Toronto; and eight grandchildren. He was predeceased by a brother Leslie and sister Mrs. Gladys Deacon.

Canon J. E. Maxwell conducted the funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were John T. 
