Tenants in apartment buildings should receive a little extra money this month under the Ontario Government's property tax reduction system. The system eases the burden of municipal and school taxes on homeowners and tenants. In

effect, the Province is pay-

ing part of the property

taxes for each eligible house and apartment. Tenants should receive their reductions on or before December 31. Many tenants with who vacated premises earlier in the year will have already received their Reg. Price 290 - SAVE 40

reductions. Here is what should happen:

IF YOU ARE A LANDLORD... You must pay the full reduction to

tenants who have occupied your premises throughout 1969. Payment must be made on or before December 31, 1969.
