LANDLORDS 'PASS IT

Most Georgetown Tenants Will Get \$44 Rebate

Local apartment dwellers must pass on to tenants of December 31, 1969 should have their reductions.

The extra cash is a benefit to which virtually all homeowners and tenants are entitled under the Ontario Government's two year old property tax reduction system. The system was established by the province last year as a means of easing the burden of municipal and school taxes. In effect, the province pays part of the property taxes on each eligible house and apartment.

The majority of Georgetown tenants will receive rebates of \$44.28 while in Esquesing the rebates will vary from \$33 to \$35, the difference influenced by fire area and street lighting.

RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY REDUCTIONS FOR 1969

A Special Tenants and Landlords

Tenants in apartment buildings should receive a little extra money this month under the Ontario Government's property tax reduction system. The system eases the burden of municipal and school taxes on homeowners and tenants. In effect, the Province is paying part of the property taxes for each eligible house and apartment.

Tenants should receive their reductions on or before December 31. Many tenants who vacated premises earlier in the year will have already received their reductions.

Here is what should happen:

IF YOU ARE A LANDLORD...
You must pay the full reduction to tenants who have occupied your premises throughout 1969. Payment must be made on or before December 31, 1969.

A tenant who moved in during the year and is still occupying your premises must receive one-twelfth of the total reduction for each month of tenancy. It must be paid on or before December 31.

A tenant who moved out during the year must receive a proportionate amount within 30 days of the date he terminated his tenancy or on December 31, whichever is earlier.
