INCLUDES BRUCE TRAIL

Would Curb Quarrying, Create Park Chain Along Escarpment

Development of a chain of parklands stretching 230 miles from the Niagara River to the tip of the Bruce Peninsula on Georgian Bay, has been recommended to the Ontario government in a report released Thursday. The chain followed the Niagara escarpment which passes just north of Georgetown and through Esqueving Township from west of Speyside to Terra Cotta.

The cost of acquiring 610 square miles of the escarpment would be about \$31,000,000.

The report, tabled in the legislature, was turned in by a 21 man commission, headed by Leonard Gerler, geography professor at University of Waterloo.

The commission calls for nine large, multi-use parks, "selective control" through access rights or lease of another 35,000 acres and "environmental control" through zoning of 300,000 acres.

CURBS ON QUARRYING

Curbs on quarrying along the escarpment rim are advocated and new quarries and new gravel pits would be banned within two miles of the escarpment face. Old pits would be filled in and restored in parks.

ALREADY LOST

Rene Brunelle, minister of lands and forests, said his department already has acquired sizeable land holdings in the escarpment area.

The report warned that some sections of the escarpment already have been lost to private development and others are endangered by the spread of housing, cottages and industrial sites.

Speculation on the government's caution in releasing the report is that land costs are a factor. The \$31,428,000 figure is based on 1967 prices.

BRUCE TRAIL

Premier Robarts has said the escarpment must be preserved because it is a recreational wonderland within 150 miles of the bulk of Ontario's population. It includes the Bruce Trail, a hikers path developed by outdoor enthusiasts.

The report said the agency should be given to acquiring and controlling land in the Niagara Peninsula where there is the greatest danger of loss to residential and industrial development.

NORTH HALTON

Control also should be exercised in the north Halton County, Caledon, Hockley Valley, Georgian Bay, and Bruce Peninsula areas, the report said.

In these, cottage and quarry development is beginning to limit public access to some of the most scenic sections of the escarpment, which stretches through nine counties.

A HAVEN

The most prominent natural feature in southern Ontario, the escarpment long has been

a haven for sportsmen, tourists, naturalists and scientists.

Under the report, all municipalities would be required

to control the environment through sections in zoning and land use by-laws and an escarpment secretariat would be created to carry out controls.

Residents Opposed to Trailer Park

Seventy-one signatures were attached to a petition received this week by Chinguacousy Township Council.

The 71 found willing ears to listen to their fears that a trailer park will be established in

the township on the Third Line West near Sideroad 5, east of Huttonville if council agrees to rezone a 40 acre lot at present zoned only for a single family residence.

But the petition was a little

early. Township administrator, Bob Holmes, said that no one had yet applied to council or planning board to have the land rezoned.

But Deputy-reeve Bob Wilson made sure the 71 don't miss out on the change to protest again if an application does arrive.

He, and other councillors, noted that the land — supposedly for a single dwelling — belongs to Industrial Trailer Rentals.

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LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

The quest for overtricks develops. He draws the last trump. If elops skills in the duplicate player that are sometimes absent in the average rubber bridge player. Occasionally these skills are required just to make a contract.

Here is a hand that occurred at the Acton Bridge Club. Most declarers had no trouble with it.

How would you have done? East dealt with both sides vulnerable.

The bidding:

Opening lead — Queen of clubs. It's unfortunate that three no trump is east, to make, whereas four spades presents a problem. However very few South's would tolerate a no trump contract with two five card suits. South's bid of three spades asks North to bid four with spade support or bid three no trump without spade support. Over three no trump, South may well bid four diamonds in an effort to find a suit contract.

Declarer covers the club lead but East turns up with the ace and returns a club. West wins and continues the suit with declarer ruffing the third and fourth. Things don't look too bad for declarer. As long as both spades and diamonds break favorably, declarer has ten-tricks.

The spade ace is cashed and a low spade led to the king. When both opponents follow, declarer knows that spades will break favorably. The last spade is left out. This may seem unusual but it is safe. Declarer must cash two diamonds before

But look what happened on this hand. On the second diamond West showed out. But West was also out of trump so he could not ruff. Declarer led a third diamond to his hand and ruffed a diamond in dummy. The defense won a heart but declarer ruffed the next lead, extracted the last trump from East. His last diamond was good for the tenth trick.
