He pointed out there was an unused reservoir owned by Georgetown on the other side of the highway, which might be reactivated.

In reply to a question from the deputy reeve, Mr. Axler stated the lots varied in size from a minimum of 60' x 132' to 200' x 560. The larger lots are estate type lots. "We want to develop it the way the municipality wants it," commented Mr. Axler.

He repeated that he wanted council's approval, subject to all the other necessary approvals.

"As far as I'm concerned you are not getting it until you at least have the Health Unit O. K." retorted the Reeve.

"Where do we stand on this holding by-law?" wondered deputy reeve Tom Hill.
