

# The World Needs Us

St. John's, Stewarttown; St. Stephen's Hornby

Thou shalt love God . . . and thy neighbour as thyself.

These words are central to the Christian faith and they mean that Christianity is a matter of loving concern. We must be concerned about God, the needs of our fellow-man,

even as we are concerned about our own lives. It isn't easy for us to be concerned about the plight of our fellow man because we have so many personal problems, anxieties, and worries. To the world we appear to be affluent, carefree, untroubled - and they cry to us for help in their hunger and their need. We fail to respond because we worry about our own concerns, our jobs, our health, our

families, etc., etc. Our situation has been illustrated by a recent song about a yellow submarine. It is, perhaps, a twentieth century parable, because people can live like submarines; it isn't as difficult as it might seem. All you have to do is: clang shut the hatch on the outside world and submerge into your own little sea. Once in a while run up the periscope to see what is happening outside, but always be sure to pull it right back down again because you won't want to become involved in all of that. There will be a lot for you to do in your small world, you can tinker with the machinery, worry over it, plot a course, work out a daily routine. But eventually the air will get stale, too stale to support life, and you will cease to function as a human being. And that will be the end of it.

The world needs us, and we have much to give. We: cannot ignore the plight of our brethren in the troubled parts of the world, in Biafra, in Viet Nam, or wherever. Because we are among those who believe in the worth of the individual, in the brotherhood of man - and these are but empty words, plous phrases, unless we are prepared to give of our time, of our money, our concern to help those whose problems, whose need, whose hunger is so much greater than our own.
