One Year Left for Georgetown As Separate Community: Snow

Legislation to create a giant metro region involving Halton and Peel counties and aquating between Toronto and Hamilton will come before the Ontario Legislature this spring, James W. Snow, Halton East MPP confirmed this week.

Snow said the department of Municipal Affairs is "close to the time when it will be ready to create the Halton-Peel Metro region... the legislation will come before the Legislature in the spring and the whole effort should go into effect as of January 1, 1971."

Snow's comment comes after voters in Burlington voted in favour of their town being part of a Halton-Peel Metro setup which would create a city of over 250,000 people.

WIPE US OUT

Plans for the amalgamation of Halton and Peel counties under a metro-form of regional government were first presented last February by provincial Municipal Affairs Minister Darcy McKeough.

At the same time, McKeough outlined his program for local government reform in the counties which he said were "highly over-governed and in need of streamlining at the municipal

level." The streamlining would be carried out by wiping out all municipal units within Halton and Peel; creating a regional council and seven borough units. This is known as "two tier" government. It is styled along the lines of government in Metro Toronto.

HALTON REGION

Halton county council oppo-

recommendations of the Steele report. McKeough, when speaking in Milton, said he was prepared to go ahead with his Halton-Peel Metro without Burlington, if necessary.

DOMINATED

Halton officials fear if they lose Burlington to Hamilton their county will be dominated by Peel when the new metro region is formed. Burlington, a town of 70,000 is Halton's largest municipality.

Without Burlington, Halton could be outvoted by the Peel representatives on the regional council.

Snow said "it will be hard for McKeough to ignore the vote by the people of Burlington which favours their town staying within Halton-Peel."

Snow said he personally favours the Halton-Peel Metro and added:

Rev. L. Wilton Leaves First Baptist, Semi-Retires

Reverend Leslie Wilton, pastor at First Baptist Church for the past three years will preach his last sermon there Sunday morning December 28. The following morning Mr. and Mrs. Wilton will move into a new house at Inverhuron where the former missionary will commence semi-retirement.

Mr. Wilton was inducted as pastor of First Baptist in September of 1966.

The church membership, adherents and friends will say farewell to the Wiltons at a social gathering in the church hall following this Sunday's evening service.

In the Inverhuron area Mr. Wilton will serve churches at Tiverton and Glamis beginning January 1.

ESTABLISHED CHURCH

Mr. Wilton succeeded Rev. Lloyd Whan here when Mr. Whan joined the Department of Reform Institutions as chaplain at Millbrook.

The Wiltons came to Georgetown from Moncton, New Brunswick, where he had helped establish Brentwood United Baptist Church.

During 28 years in India Mr. Wilton served in many capacities which included evangelization, education, publishing in both English and Telegu and the administration of various mission institutions from land settlement to the business management of a hospital.

Later he was principal of the School of Theology and devoted his time to the training of young men to minister in the 160 churches of the mission.

RECREATIONAL OFFICER

During World War II Mr. Wilton left the mission for a year to serve as an emergency officer of the Indian government in eastern Bengal and Assam. He later served in the same area as senior secretary of the army YMCA, ministering to the recreational needs of Indian, British, American, African and Chinese troops.

After a health handicap ruled out further service in India, he served as pastor of First Baptist Church, Tillsonburg, for three years, and then joined the staff of the United Baptist Bible training school in Moncton. Mrs. Wilton was secretary of the same school.

In 1961 he began pioneering a new Baptist charge in Brentwood subdivision there which led to the establishment of the church he served before coming to Georgetown.
