**Christmas Candy**

You will enjoy making, as well as the results, of this candy recipe. It would be well to have a candy thermometer, but the recipe is not difficult.

- 3 cups of sugar
- 1 1/2 cups flake coconut
- 1 1/2 cups corn syrup
- 1 teaspoon soda
- 1 tablespoon butter
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup roasted almonds — chopped

First butter a cookie sheet 15 1/2 by 10 1/2 and sprinkle on one half of the coconut. Combine syrup, sugar and water. Over medium heat, stir only until sugar is completely dissolved and mixture starts boiling. Wipe own pan sides with damp cloth to remove any sugar crystals, then boil without stirring ends, reduce heat and stir until butter is melted. Remove from heat and add the soda and salt. Stir vigorously for half minute. Flour evenly over the baking pan sprinkled with coconut. Spread thinly and cover with the remaining coconut. Roll with a rolling pin to flatten, then mark one inch squares before it hardens. It's a good idea to go over and over your markings with a knife, so that it will break into neat pieces when it is cold.

**Residents Still Protest,  
Debate Raceway Issue**

The proposed raceway between the 3rd and 4th lines, north of 401, brought protesting ratepayers to Esqueping council again Monday afternoon.

This time Reeve George Currie laid down the law saying only the three residents who by letter indicated their intention to appear could speak. "The discussion becomes a Donnybrook when 40 are here all trying to speak at once" he remarked.

T. W. Oliver a 4th line resident claimed the noise not only from the track but from the traffic involved would be a nuisance.

While admitting many fine people attended raceways, he claimed it also attracted an undesirable type. He contended further that the warm ups would attract people who might set up tents and do outside cooking. He claimed the trials also attract crowds.

**EFFECT ON FUTURE**

Continuing he said the traffic could not be dispersed easily. He listed sanitation as a problem. Here the reeve interrupted him and stated the project would have to be approved by the Department of Health.

Mr. Oliver then asked what kind of revenue would be expected, in comparison to a subdivision of similar size, and what effect it would have on future development as a residential-area.

"The Planning Board might not designate it a residential area, when our official plan is approved" commented deputy reeve Tom Hill.

"The Mohawk Raceway has more assessment than the whole of Nassagaweya put together" remarked the Reeve.

**NO TROUBLE**

"Whatever the assessment it would be a lot higher than we are getting now" added the deputy reeve.

Referring to Mr. Oliver's comment about the type of people attending the track, the deputy reeve stated, "If somebody is putting up 2 1/2 million dollars they're not going to allow any foolishness. You never see any 'foolishness' at Mohawk, do you?" he queried. Deputy Reeve Tom Hill claimed there was very little trouble and time involved in emptying

Mohawk or Woodbine raceways.

The other two-residents Leonard Zions and Eric De Vogel said Mr. Oliver had already stated their views.

"Can the council legally prevent the development of this track?" asked Mr. Oliver.

**HOLDING BY-LAW**

The deputy reeve pointed out that the township now has the holding by-law, which if approved by the OMB would be included in the registered plan. "The planning board will designate the land what zone they feel it should be," he stated.

"The whole thing hinges on the registered plan brought in by the Planning Board" said the deputy reeve. "I imagine if these people are turned down they will go to the Ontario Municipal Board, who will probably have the final decision."

The Reeve thanked the residents for their presentation.

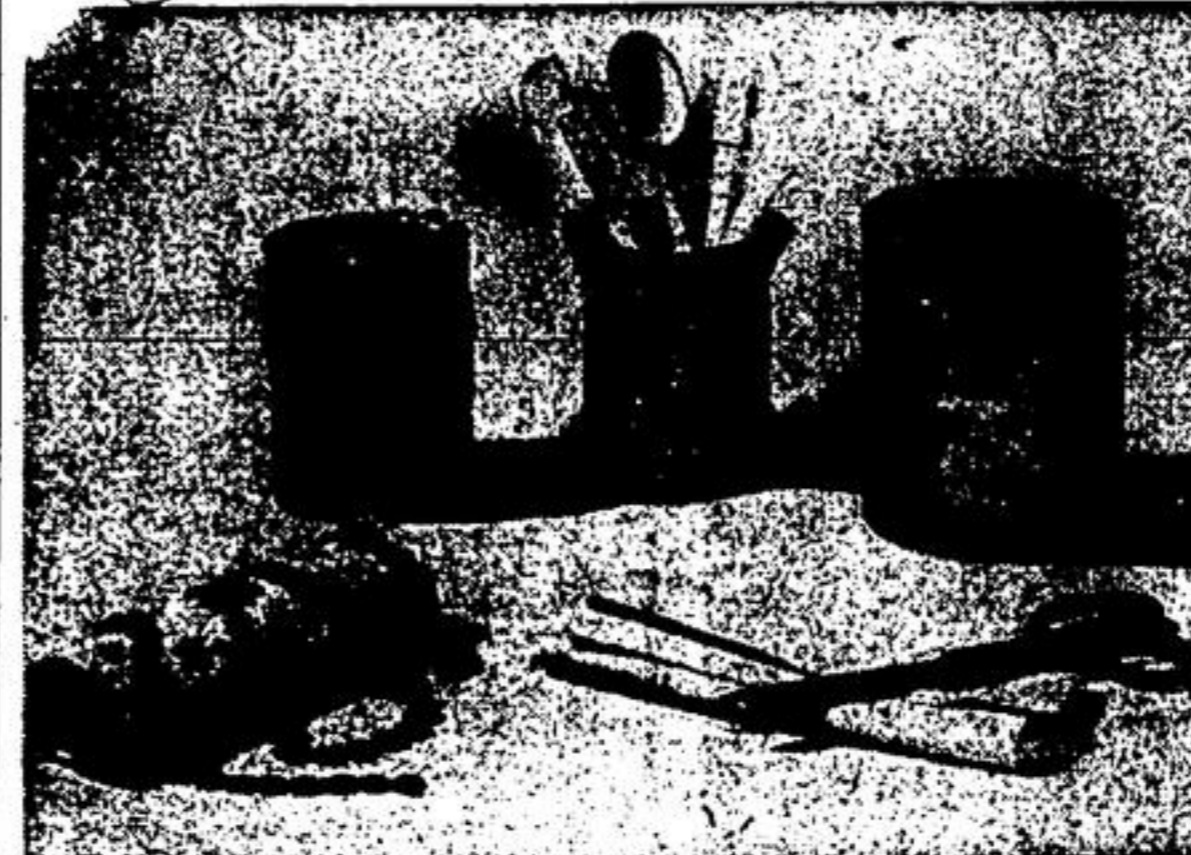


Enough ribbon to circle the earth at the equator 100 times will decorate the nation's holiday gifts this year. Americans spend \$20 million annually on ribbons and bows.
