## Defence Cuts Only Minor For Lorne Scots Regiment

The Lorne Scots Regiment, escaped with minor losses when the Department of National Defence wiped out part of their reserves with a reduction program announced this week.

The Lorne Scots' C Company is based at Georgetown.

Lt.-Col. Earl Lince of Georgetown, commanding officer of the Lorne Scots, said that the regiment's strength will be cut, but that the armoured units in Brampton, Georgetown and Oakville will still be used.

### CUT TO 271

Defence minister Leo Cadieux announced earlier that the militia will be reduced by 4,000 men in the next year and that 41 armoured units would be closed.

"The Lorne Scots, the only infantry regiment in Ontario with a strength of 890, will be cut to 271 personnel, all ranks.

"I think we have been pretty lucky," said Lince. "But I won't really know until I can compare our figures with other regiments."

Lince also said that according to his information, no infantry units in Ontario will be disbanded.

Former commanding officer of the Lorne Scots, Lt.-Col. E. S. (Ted) Conover, commented, "Any cut in strength is serious but the changes they have announced are not as bad as those proposed by the DND last summer. Then, they considered cutting all regiments to a strength of about 125 all ranks.

"I think that move has been coming for some time," said Col. S. R. Charters, a former commanding officer of the Lorne Scots. "I think also that the cuts made in the regiment's strength show the confidence the DND has in the fine record the Lorne Scots have compiled."

Lt.-Col. J. R. Barber of Georgetown honorary colonel of the Lorne Scots said the new system with 20 districts instead of seven will give many excellent militia commanders some where to go when they retire as commanding officers.

only allowed a certain length of time before they must retire," he said. "This new system should give them the opportunity for promotion, possibly as high as brigadier, and let them continue serving their country.

"I am sure, as far as the Lorne Scots are concerned that the regiment's fine record over the years, having been in the top 10 regiments, for the last ten years, and coming second overall last year, influenced the DND decision. The public also reacted strongly to the proposed cuts and made their wishes known.

### EXPANDABLE

"In the past 20 years," said Barber, "the efficiency of the militia has greatly increased and will continue to do so.

"This country has a lot that other countries would like, and if they see us helpless you can't tell what might happen. It is important to have an expandable army: we are vulnerable."
