

**Garage Operator Served in Navy Merchant Marine**

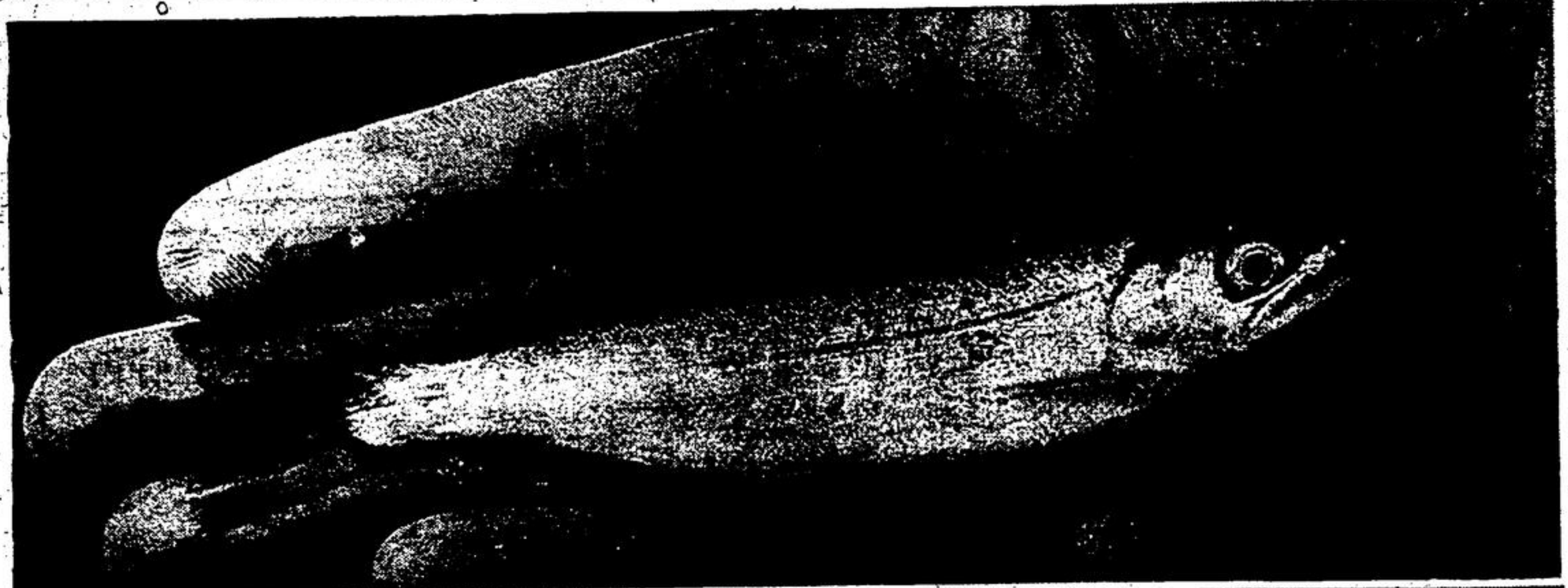
One of Georgetown's oldest businessmen, William John Cain, 76, died at his home, 26 John Street East on Dec. 7. Mr. Cain had operated a garage business on Victoria Street for many years.

Prior to that he was in the navy for seven years, five of these overseas, and had been a captain's mate on the lake freighter service. He was a member of Loyal Orange Lodge 245 and had held various offices in the lodge over the years.

Mr. Cain was born in Cheltenham, son of James and Mary Stokes Cain, and attended school there.

He leaves a brother Wilbert of Sault Ste. Marie and sister Margaret of Georgetown. He was predeceased by brothers Edward of Radville, Saskatchewan and Robert of Glen Williams and a sister Mrs. William Davidson of Georgetown.

Rev. Leslie Wilton of First Baptist Church conducted the funeral service at the Harold G. McClure Funeral Home and interment was in Glen Williams Cemetery. Pallbearers were Starrett Leslie, Howard Dolson, Thomas Warnes, George Inglis, Clue Montgomery and Clarence Carey.

**Snow's Amendment Adds Humane Society Rep.**

Just before the legislature approved the new bill, Mr. Snow said afterward. But he felt the Humane Society has done a tremendous job of protecting animals over the years and suggested to the government the inclusion of an OHS member would alleviate some of the problems.

Mr. Snow had been a member of the government's standing committee on health, where his amendment had been supported by the opposition and Conservation Society members. So he brought the amendment before the house and following a lengthy debate and an NDP attempt to change his amendment, it was passed.

The local MPP said he fully supports the procurement bill, as it provides for complete control, licensing and inspection of all research facilities as well as providing sufficient animals for research. Some of the anti-vivisectionists in Ontario will never be satisfied, he added, but the government refused to bow to the pressure groups.

Meanwhile he has had numerous phone calls and telegrams supporting his stand.

Mr. Snow noted animals wouldn't be obtained from humane society shelters only stray dogs and cats from pounds. The animals must be kept for three days (plus Sundays and holidays) to allow owners to retrieve their pets, then they are sent to research facilities instead of being put to death. The MPP was also pleased that the new bill provides a "pain clause" to eliminate any suffering by animals used for research.

**A.G. To Investigate Youth Held in Jail**

Attorney General Arthur Wishart has said he will investigate the case of an 18 year old Georgetown youth who was held in jail because he could not get professional psychiatric examination.

Wishart was told this week that provincial judge James R. Black committed the Georgetown youth to Halton county jail because he could not get the teenager into an Ontario hospital for psychiatric examination.

the youth to jail said "I'm afraid if we release you it will mean you will just get into trouble again."

**FOUR CHARGES**

The court had been told the Ontario Hospital in Hamilton refused to take the accused youth, while Toronto facilities were filled up.

The boy appeared before Judge Black on four charges under the liquor control act and two of creating a disturbance.
