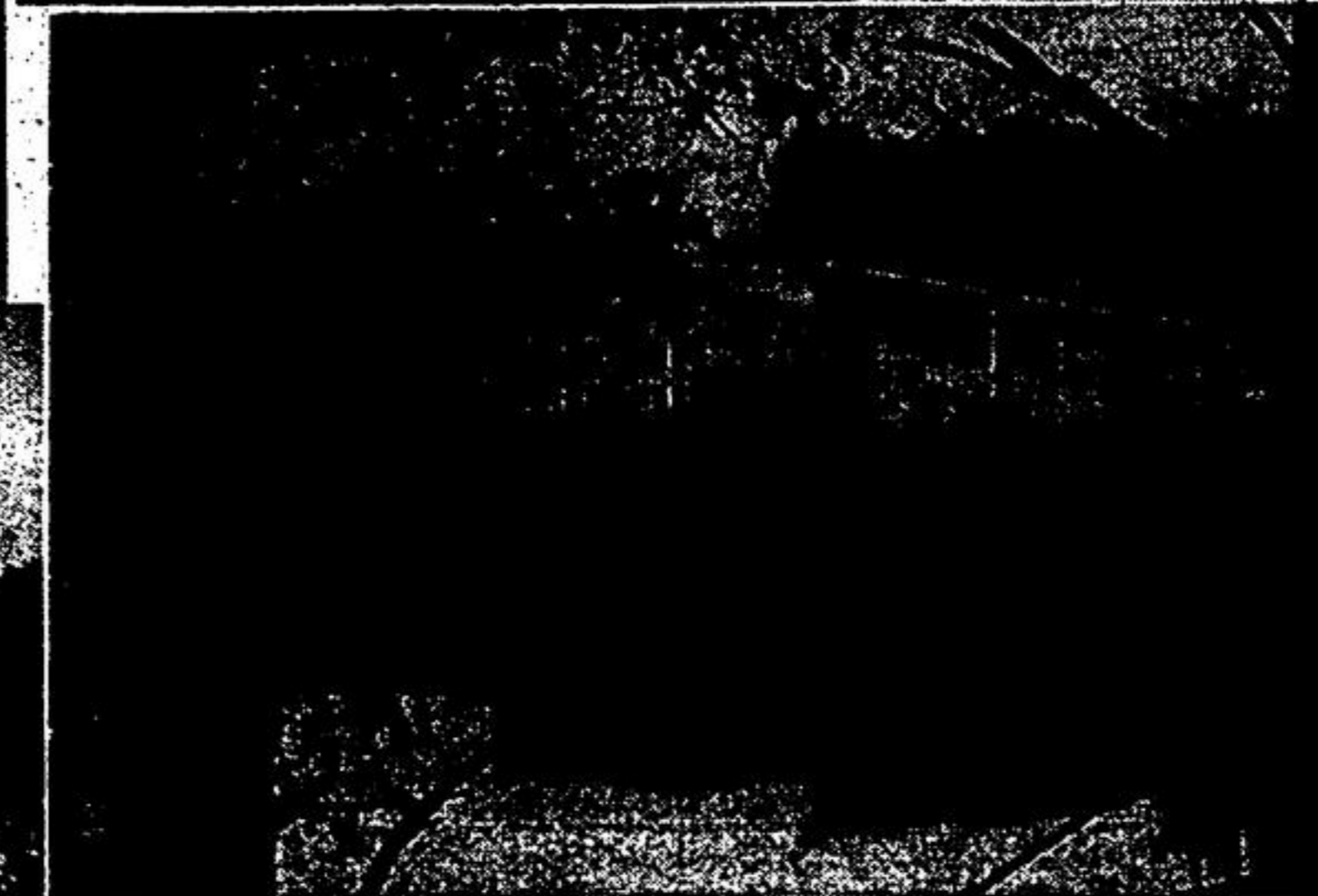

Hill Interested, May Seek Post as Warden

As many as five men may be nominated for the post of Warden of Halton County for 1970. The wide-open race for the county's top seat has an added incentive this time as the 1970 warden may be the last man to hold that position if regional government is brought into effect in 1971.

Reeve Alan Day of Oakville appears to be the top contender but there's a good indication his nomination will be contested by other members of the 14-man county council. Reeves and deputy Reeves of Halton's seven municipalities form the county body and two other Reeves and two deputy Reeves appear to be interested in holding the top chair this year.

Reeve elect Ron Harris of Milton, who has served on the council for the past two years as deputy reeve, confirms he will likely be nominated at the inaugural meeting held early in January. If the "turn" system of rotating the top chair through the seven towns and townships is used, it will be Milton's turn in 1970 but reeve elect Harris said he was not actively campaigning for the post.

Deputy Reeve William Gillies of Oakville has indicated he may challenge his town's reeve for the job. Although he hasn't yet made a firm decision he did note the need for "strong opinions" and aggressive leadership on the county government. He is especially concerned about the impending regional government.

Reeve Francis Oakes, Acton reports he is "considering" running for Warden, but has not yet made a decision.

The other possible contender is Esquesing's Deputy Reeve Tom Hill who has indicated he would like to succeed Esquesing Reeve George Currie in the top county chair. While it would be unusual for a deputy reeve to hold the post, county officials say it could happen. The warden's job usually goes to a reeve.
