During the afternoon and evening, over a hundred friends called to wish happiness to Mr. and Mrs. A. Hornsey who were married in All Saints Church, Toronto on December 24, 1919.

Mrs. Arthur Herbert Lived Here 50 Years

A Georgetown resident since 1919, Mrs. Arthur C. Herbert, 78, died in Georgetown hospital on December 19, where she had been a patient since suffering a heart attack while attending the senior citizens dinner the week before.

Mrs. Herbert who lived at 81 Main Street North, was born in Lanark, Scotland, and was the former Marie Carmen Coia, daughter of Antonio Coia and Emilie Valera. She attended St. Mary's R. C. School and finishing school where she received her teacher's certificate for millinery, tailoring and dressmaking.

Married in Wales in 1917, Mr. and Mrs. Herbert came to Georgetown to make their home in 1919. She was a lover of music and for many years sang in St. George's Anglican and Knox Presbyterian Church choirs, where Mr. Herbert's uncle, the late Arthur Castelli was choir master. During World War II she worked at Avro Aircraft.

Predeceased in 1961 by her husband, she leaves two children, Norman and Valerie, Mrs. Enrico Caruso, and grandchildren Gary and Sherrine Herbert, Christine and John Tost, of town; a brother Antonio Coia, Ayr, Scotland and sisters Mrs. Nino Cipalato (Georgina) of Ayr, Mrs. J. Drummond (Joan) of Lanark and Mrs. J. Weston (Emilie) of Didcott, England. She was predeceased by a brother Francis of Lanark and sister Mrs. J. Schenk (Phyllis) in England.

Funeral service at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home was conducted by Rev. Eric Mills of St. George's Anglican Church and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were a grandson Gary Herbert, nephew Maurice Herbert, Harry Hale, Jr., Roger Schofield, Robert Gougeon and John T. Armstrong.

Mrs. Robert Hedley, Norval and Mrs. Ron Hedley, Oakville poured tea in the afternoon, with Brampton friends, Mrs. Gordon Pearce and Mrs. Ron Hill pouring tea in the evening. A money tree was presented to the guests of honour who have spent 45 years of their married life in Brampton, where he had been employed with Copeland-Chatterton until his retirement. Prior to that they farmed at Hastings. Both were born in England, Mr. Hornsey at Langton, near London and Mrs. Hornsey who is the former Gertrude Alcock at Cheadle, Staffordshire.

Mr. Hornsey served overseas with the Black Watch in World War I and is service officer for Branch 15 Royal Canadian Legion in Brampton. His wife is past president of the Legion Ladies auxiliary, a member of Peel hospital auxiliary and they are members of the senior citizens club.

They have two children, Mrs. Robert Hedley, 7 Brucewood Road, and Harold in California, and three granddaughters, Lynda and Sharon Hornsey, Brampton and Brenda Hedley, Georgetown.
