Assessment goes regional

There isn't any assessor at the town office any more. The Ontario Government took over assessment on a province-wide basis on Jan. 1 and in future all assessing for Halton and Peel Counties will be handled from the new regional assessment office located in Brampton.

Former Halton County assessor Robert Beach has been named regional assessment commissioner for Halton and Peel, working under the direction of area director Carl J. Magdett. Mr. Magdett's area covers seven counties. Working with Mr. Beach will be all the present assessment staffs of the municipalities in Halton and Peel. This includes Milton's assessor Jack Charlton, Esquesing's Art Benton and Geoff Denny, Acton's Hugh

Hunter and Georgetown's Tom James and Marshall Bain. Mrs. Billy Jackson of the Halton assessment department is also moving to the Brampton office to work with Mr. Beach. Some of the staff from Burlington and Oakville will be working from the Brampton office and some are expected to be set up in a sub-office on Kerr St. in Oakville. The Brampton office is located at 168 Kennedy Rd. All local records have been transferred to this office. Arrangements are being made with local municipalities to have office space available for short periods of time, when assessors visit the area municipalities.

Specialists in residential, industrial, commercial, farm and special assessing are to be named to head up these divisions, working under Mr. Beach. To

achieve uniformity in property evaluation by re-assessing all properties in Ontario on the same basis at market value by 1975. To the local taxpayer this means his assessment notice will reflect the marketable value of his property. Right now

assessing has been done on an old manual locally and figures on current assessment notices likely indicate about 20 to 35 per cent of the resale value of your property. Mill rates, of course, will likely go down when the assessment is put on a market value system.
