Do you find you self cringing to house when you hear of the extensive use of dring abuse in our community today?

Why worry? After all, do you really know what the problem is? At a recent meeting held in town, while

listening to informed persons whose life work brings them into contact with drug abuse, I was overwhelmed with the extent and availability of drugs in our town today.

This wasn't the first time I heard out society described as "chemical oriented" but somehow it made a deeper impression. I dare say all of us are on drugs of one form or another. Properly administered and under supervised control, drugs can prove beneficial and prevent undue suffering and disease.

The problem is not the wide use of drugs, but the wide misuse of drugs by uninformed individuals who want to be "turned on". Perhaps in many cases it is a one shot attempt, but what about the others whose personality dependencies on the drugs lead to an habitual nightmate?

If your reaction is one of disbehel and you feel the whole subject is over-tated, listen to these words written in a national newspaper. "And in a country where 144 million doses of amphetamines and 408 million doses of barbiturates were prescribed in 1969, where you can practically taste the grass the minute you set foot in any Canadian high school, we feel it's an epidemic that can't be ignored,"

The problem is with us. We have to learn to face the facts of the

As I sat with other concerned ettisens, teachers, nurses, dectors, hushiosa men and police and concerned young people we found ourselves agreeing on the ingoney of the situation in town. Perhaps the only concrete action that has been taken in town is by the police. But thou only recourse is to arrest and presecute. They try to apprehend the pushers, hoping to climinate the source.

Knox figures show steady increases recommended addition being planned


A woll-attended por luck supper preceded the annual meeting of Knox Prosbyterian church. The congregational meal before the meeting was tried last year and attendance was even better this year.

Films were shown while the tables were cleared and dishes done, and other films were shown to the children during the business meeting.

Mimeographed reports were circulated, discussed and accepted. A total budget of \$26,450 was

approved, an increase of \$150 over last year. New managers elected for a three year term are Ross Britton. James McVeigh, Mathys Splinter and Mac Sprowl. Returning for another three year term are Doug Mason, Bob Paul and Bert Rennick. Returning for a one year term, to complete an unexpired term is Calvin McIntyre. Auditors are James R. Inglis, Robert R. Parker and

Herbert L. Ritchie. The Rev. A. H. McKenzie chaired the meeting and Mac



The sound of exploding firecrackers mingled with the singing of hymns at the recent dedication of the first Christian Church to be built on the island of Matsu just off the coast of Mainland China.

The story of the church begins in a Christian hospital where a Chinese woman who lives in Matsu was given a Bible. Reading this copy of Scripture resulted in the woman's becoming a Christian. Later she formed a Bible Class in her home. The rapid growth of the class led to the organizing of a church.

The new building was put up with the help of the United Methodist Board of Missions. Matsu island is controlled from Taiwan.

Sprowl acted as secretary.

A 14-year comparison of church figures was presented for the interest of members. Over the years, almost everything has gone up steadily with one notable exception.

The number of households in the congregation stood at 296 in 1956. It topped 300 the next year, and reached 400 in 1967. The past year there were 415 households.

In 1956 membership stood at 502. Although it declined in the middle of the 14-year span it was back to 500 in 1964 and has risen steadily till it's 544 now. The minister's stipend reflects

the steady increase and was \$3,300 in 1956. Expenditures in all departments rise in proportion, although this coming year's budget was topped four times in the past.

The only column which shows a decrease instead of an increase is the "baptisms". There were 34 in 1956, and the figures through the years reach as high as 40 before dropping to 16 in 1969. One of these was an adult. As well as the reports of receipts and expenditures in the general account, the congregation read the detailed reports of the legacy account, renovation fund, building fund and national development fund.

The session reported that during the past year Knox lost A 15 members by death, John Dennis, Edith Wright, Minnie Somerville, Ellen Waldie, Jean McIsaac, Carl Hansen, Catherine Brown, Dorothy Stapleton, Elsie Johnson, Mary Young, Gerald Robinson, Bertha Lantz, Albert Robinson, Duncan Waldie and George Withers. "The death of so many stalwart members (21/2 per cent of our membership) gave a sad tone to the whole year," the report stated, During Mr. McKenzie's ministry of over 13 years, 104 members have passed away.

During the year 26 new members were received, 27 funerals and 17 weddings conducted.

The session's oldest member, Duncan Waldie, died just 16 days short of his 90th birthday.

Preferred treatment tor residents

One township councillor from the district has admitted that residents of the township get preferred treatment when it comes to getting approval for home sites.

Councillor Jack Hohenadel told members of the Guelph suburban planning board that the Ontario Municipal Board approved only a limited number of housing lots a year in the township of Puslinch, Council, he said, approved them for its own residents before giving approval to some joker from another township.

When asked by fellow board members if he did not think this was discriminatory, Mr. Hohenadel said if a person lived all his life in the township and wants permission to build a retirement home, council would fight for him ahead of someone else.
