Limit power Whiting tells Commons

In a fifteen minute address from the floor of the House of Commons Rud Whiting, Halton MP last week urged the government to take all necessary steps to limit the power of automobiles and to provide more safety on Canadian Highways.

Mr. Whiting suggested an amendment to Bill-137 to evolve around a limitation of horsepower for public automobiles as an added safety measure on our highways.

Whiting criticized manufacturers for promoting high powered cars. "Hardly a day goes by when someone is not brought into our hospital


