The coffee house dance is open to the public beginning at 8.00 - 11.00 on Thursday. Entertainment will be provided.


The Variety Show, Friday night will commence at 8.00. All day Saturday there will be a variety of activities with races. tug-of-war and a wood chopping contest to name a few.

Brian Skerrett brought up the subject of freedom in schools. One source of reference which he read stated that principals, vice principals and teachers cause as many problems as they solve by harassing the students.

Mrs. McInery suggested the establishment of human relations because often the students are at fault, too. The final opinion was "The youth can respect you if you respect them.

The discussion now varied from the legalization of marijuana, to lowering the drinking age and even to whose fault the war is to be blamed on. One panelist felt that the more permissiveness the young adults get then the more they want.
