Let's Play Bridge

Hands which play in game or slam in both directions are always challenging and interesting. Here is one that came up during the regular duplicate game at the Acton Bridge Dealer South . East-West

A couple of pairs reached four

Opening lead-Ace of diamonds,

hearts and made the contract with overtricks. One East-West ended up in five diamonds doubled. As you can see, this contract makes with West losing only one spade and one heart. There is no easy way to bid this hand once East-West start bidding diamonds. I suppose some West would be reluctant to bid over South's one spade opener. After all West does hold five spades and East-West are vulnerable whereas

their opponents are not.
North's bid of six hearts is strictly a gamble. He has no way of knowing that South has exactly the ace-king of spades and the ace of hearts. However South did open the bidding and obviously does not have much in diamonds and clubs.

There is no problem to the play of the hand. Declarer ruffs the opening lead in dummy. He leads a trump covering East's honor. When the trump split two one,

declarer can leave East with his high trump. Declarer can cash his high spades and clubs and proceed to cross ruff the test of his cards.


