Georgetown drug raid

Marijuana, hashish and LSD were among the drugs confiscated by police in a raid on a Georgetown house.

Sixty charges are being laid against 38 people found in the house when nine police officers in two squads broke up a party in the raid which was "the result of several weeks of investigation" according to Georgetown Police Chief Harley Lowe.

The squads were made up of Georgetown police, Ontario Provincial Police and RCMP officers.

The youngest of the 38 at the party was 15. Three were adults, and the rest between the ages of 16 and 21. Some were "known criminals" according to Chief Lowe. Most were Georgetown high school students, girls as well as boys. Three were from Toronto, others from Glen Williams and Norval.

Charges laid and pending are under the Narcotics Control Act, Food and Drug Act, Juvenile Delinquency Act, Liquor Control Act and Child Welfare Act.

One of the group had to be taken to the psychiatric ward at Peel Memorial Hospital. He was formally charged the next day.

Police also suspect a drug called MDA, known to users as "blue music," was being used. It was described as extremely dangerous, and can cause recurring trips weeks and months after the user has taken it.

No trip to Africa

FERGUSON A policy of the old Centre Wellington high school board to allow Fergus students to finance a trip to Africa has been tentatively reversed by the year-old county board.

Since the trips to both Africa and England received the support of the old board more than a year ago, close to 60 students have been working during the summer and on evenings and weekends to raise the necessary money (between \$550 and \$900). No definite date was set for the excursion but the county board vetoed a trip during the school year and the students and teachers say it is impossible to take the trip during the summer holidays because there would be no opportunity to raise the money.

A number of students are interested in the overseas trip but with the change in organization it is apparently inevitable that many educational projects are, for the time being, held up in the log jam of administrative procedures pending the board making policy decisions.

The school was successful in taking 750 students to Expo, in Montreal, without any cost to the taxpayer.

Pool for Erin?

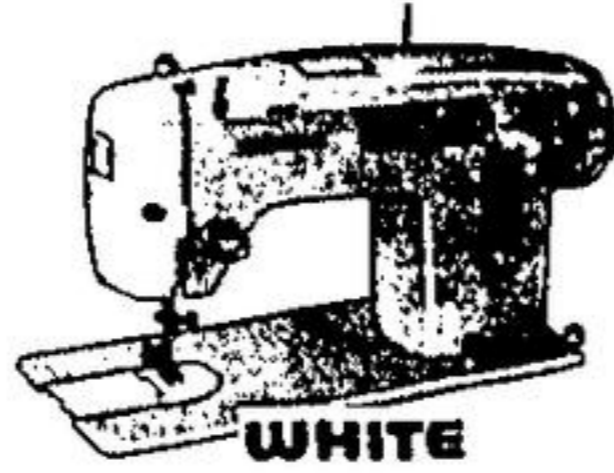
ERIN A swimming pool committee is being formed by Erin Recreation, Parks and Community Centre committee. Various organizations are being asked to send a representative.
