**Don't hamper work of busy firefighters**

During our reporting week Feb. 22 to March 1, the men at the Acton Detachment while working 265 hours patrolled 665 miles of the town roads.

It was a very busy week and the occurrences investigated were varied and many. Two break and enters and a theft from a parked car started the week rolling, and a total of five juveniles were questioned in regard to stealing from local stores. A case of fraud was reported and a man is in custody for this offence.

A total of five charges were laid in respect to the abuse of alcohol. They were, two minors charged with drinking under age, one charge of having liquor other than in a residence, and one of impaired driving, and last but not least a charge of being drunk in a public place.

Five charges and six warnings were given out to motorists for breaking the rules of the Highway Traffic Act, and a minor accident resulting in total damages of \$40 rounded off the traffic scene.

In Provincial Court held at Milton on Feb. 23, three convictions were registered

which realized fines in the amount of \$250.

We would like to urge the people who flock to the fire hall as soon as the siren is sounded to keep away and let the firefighters arrive and depart to the fire in safety. The firefighters in this town do a great job and perform a very much needed service to the community. So let them get on with their work and don't hamper them!

Yield the right of way to the fire truck when the siren and red light are being used, and don't follow them to the fire. By law you must not follow a fire truck at any distance less than 500 feet.
